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Message from the President



Primary Care is extremely important to any healthcare system in the world. The research evidence by the late Prof Barbara Starfield shows that a greater emphasis in a country on Primary Care and Family Medicine can be expected to lower the cost of care, improve health through access to more appropriate services and reduce the inequities in a population of health. The ultimate goal of Primary Care is better health for all.

Family Physicians, nurses and other allied professionals are the pillars to achieve this goal.

The 6th Hong Kong Primary Care Conference will happen on 4-5 June 2016. The organizing committee has chosen "A Flourishing Community- Our Vision in Primary Care" as the main theme to address present and future development in Hong Kong and worldwide. We are privileged to have Prof Michael Kidd, President of the World Organization of Family Doctors (WONCA), Prof Sophia Chan, Under Secretary of Food and Heath Bureau, Hong Kong SAR and Prof Lam Tai Pong, Professor, Department of Family Medicine and Primary Care, The University of Hong Kong to deliver three high power plenary lectures, namely "Flourishing Communities- How do we Achieve our Global Vision for Primary Care", "Primary Care Development in Hong Kong" and "Future developments of Family Medicine in Hong Kong"respectively. This year we even have two workshops on Communication Skills in Putonghua to address local and Greater China participants. Don't miss this great event.

Immediately after the Primary Care Conference will be the 29th Fellowship Conferment Ceremony and the 27th Dr. Sun Yat Sen Oration on 5th June 2016 afternoon. The orator will be Prof. Gabriel M Leung, Dean, Li Ka Shing Faculty of Medicine, The University of Hong Kong. Obviously Prof Leung is the best person to mark the 150th anniversary of the birth of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, an alumnus of HKU. All Members and Fellows are most welcome to attend and join us on this memorable occasion.

The Medical Registration (Amendment) Bill 2016 has caused a storm in our medical field. The President of Hong Kong Medical Association (HKMA) has resigned without the support to call for referendum to release the 7 seats occupied by HKMA for open election by all members. One Lawmaker has criticised the government saying that half of the 26 voters in the Academy of Medicine (HKAM) were not doctors. In fact all AM Council members are doctors. A lot of members and fellows are not clear with the composition of the Medical Council (MCHK) and ask me if the College has any representative.

The existing MCHK consists of 28 members. Of the 14 elected members, 7 are elected by all Hong Kong doctors and 7 are

elected by the HKMA Council. Of the 14 appointed members, 2 of each are from Department of Health (DH), Hospital Authority (HA), Hong Kong Academy of Medicine (HKAM), The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CU) and The University of Hong Kong (HKU) and the remaining 4 are lay members. The saga starts with the Government proposing to have extra 4 lay members. Due to professional autonomy, most doctors prefer to increase the number of elected members by 4 simultaneously . Now the latest proposal is 4-2+2. This means 2 appointed seats from the HKAM will be converted to elected category with election by the Academy Council and therefore the total number of elected members will be 16 and the appointed members are 8 lay members plus 2 of each from DH, HA, CU and HKU. With this proposal, there are still 24 doctors versus 8 lay members.

In fact our best representation is from HKAM. HKCFP is one of the founding Colleges of HKAM and I am a member of HKAM Council representing the College. AM Council has agreed to keep the current practice of having nomination and election conducted within HKAM Council. Election of representatives via the HKAM Council demonstrates fairness to all Colleges irrespective of their sizes, which vary significantly from under 200 to over 1,600 Fellows. A general polling is fair to individual Fellows but may sacrifice the rights of Colleges with a smaller number of Fellows. Weighing the two, the rights of Colleges are more important, as each specialty College makes an equal contribution to the public. However, HKAM Council at the last meeting agreed in principle that the nomination could be open to all Fellows if necessary, as long as the election should still be within Council in order to protect the interest of Colleges with fewer number of Fellows. HKAM has no objection to the socalled 4-2+2 proposal, given that it does not alter the existing practice of the Academy and could help achieve the aim of having 1:1 ratio of "elected" to "appointed" members in MCHK. There was no objection to supporting the addition of lay members to MCHK.

The mottos of the MCHK are: Maintaining Professionalism, Protecting the Public and Ensuring Justice. Looking at the mottos superficially, 2 out of 3 has nothing

to do with professional autonomy. A lot of us are still registered with General Medical Council, UK. GMC has 24 Council members consisting 12 medical doctors and 12 lay members. All members were appointed following an independent appointment process. Our profession in Hong Kong has been lucky so far but for how long!



Diploma in Family Medicine (HKCFP) 2016-17

The Board is pleased to announce that the Diploma Course in Family Medicine (DFM) organized by The Hong Kong College of Family Physicians will commence in July 2016.

The course consists of FIVE modules. Modules I & II will be delivered by Local Distance Learning. Modules III, IV & V consist of lectures, seminars, tutorials, workshops and clinical attachments. The whole course requires ONE year of part-time studies.

Details of the course are as follows:

1. Objectives:

- i) To provide knowledgeable, pragmatic and structured teaching in Family Medicine for medical practitioners.
- ii) To encourage professional development of practising medical practitioners and to provide an intermediate step to fellowship qualifications in Family Medicine.
- iii) To improve standards and quality in the practice of Family Medicine.

2. *Syllabus:

The course consists of FIVE compulsory modules. Doctors who have graduated from the course are expected to have acquired:

- i) Current concepts about nature of Family Medicine

Module V - Practical Family Medicine (Practical Workshops)

Aims:	Enhance practical and communication skills in Family Medicine by Practical Workshops in selected areas including CPR, Consultation Skills, Counselling Skills, Women's Health, Orthopaedic Injection and Musculo-Skeletal Medicine

3. Articulations:

HKCFP Trainees Research Fund 2016 / HKCFP Research Seed Fund 2016

The Research Committee of HKCFP is proud to continue to offer the two research funds, The Trainees Research Fund and the Research Seed Fund.

The Trainees Research Fund will be opened to all registered HKCFP trainees and is made of four awards (each up to HK\$5,000). It is envisaged it will help trainees especially (but not limited to) those doing research projects as their exit examination. Those who have funding support elsewhere will not be considered.

The Research Seed Fund is open to all HKCFP members when a maximum of \$10,000 award will be made to the successful applicant to assist the conduction of a research project.

Winners of the award will receive 50% of the approved grant up front and the remainder 50% upon completion of the project.

Please note that each applicant can only apply either one of the above Funds

Assessment Criteria for both funds:

- 1. Academic rigor of the paper (e.g. originality, methodology, organisation and presentation);



By the time you read this article you may come across an important day for us, World Family Doctor Day [WFDD] [19th May]. How many of you know the history of this day and the main theme for this year?



Let us revisit this World Family Doctor Day:

World Family Doctor Day – 19th May - was first declared by WONCA in 2010 and it has become a day to highlight the role and contribution of family doctors in health care systems around the world. World Family Doctor Day 2016 - Family Doctors: Brighten your life




To commemorate the World Family Doctor Day (19th May), the Hong Kong College of Family Physicians and Primary Care Office have co-organised a publicity event on 15th May to raise awareness of the general public about the important role of family doctors in maintaining their mental health besides physical health, in the primary care setting.

A family doctor, being the first point of contact for individuals and families in a continuing health-care process, cares about patients beyond treatment of their diseases in the primary care setting. Family doctor is capable of providing comprehensive, continuing, whole person and preventive care to both patients and their families so as to ensure their physical, psychological and social well-being.

Mental health is as important as physical health. Mood problems are common in Hong Kong. Opportunity is taken to raise public awareness that family doctors can play a vital role in maintaining mental health of his/her patients. Family doctors are well positioned to tackle mental health issues in the primary care setting.

Even many events happened over the past few years, we, as family doctors, are still in our position to safeguard the wellbeing of our patients and the community. So let's take the chance to celebrate the progress being made in family medicine and the special contributions of family doctors in Hong Kong.





E-Cigarettes - friend or fiend?

Through local statistics, we learnt that smoking costs Hong Kong over \$5 Billion every year¹ and it is related to the top leading causes of deaths (cancers, pneumonia, heart diseases, cerebrovascular diseases & chronic lower respiratory diseases) in the recent years², whilst in 2015 our local prevalence of smokers is around 10.5%. Our government is striving with all kinds of tobacco control policies (in terms of legislation, law enforcement, publicity and education, smoking cessation and taxation, etc.) to discourage and protect our citizens from tobacco smoking and in recent years, this leads to heightened concerns amongst some smokers to start considering smoke cessation.

News about smoke cessation therapy is ever updating throughout the world and there are currently a lot of hot debates about e-cigarettes. In the UK, an expert independent evidence review published by Public Health England (PHE) in August 2015³ concluded that "e-cigarettes being significantly less harmful to health than tobacco and have the potential to help smokers quit smoking". This was also followed by Britain's medicines regulator, The Medicines and Healthcare Products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) awarding a licence to a tobacco company for its e-cigarette device that will allow it to be marketed as a smoking cessation aid⁴.

How e-cigarettes work and are they risk free?

E-cigarettes are handheld battery-powered devices, formally and collectively known as Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems (ENDS) containing a heating element to atomise the "e-juice" liquid (which usually containing liquid nicotine, propylene glycol, glycerin, flavouring and other potential substances). When air passes through the device, the nicotine mixture is vapourised through heating and is inhaled by its user⁵.

From the recent news, a lot of doctors (and even voices from the general public) are beginning to ask if e-cigarettes are completely safe and

considerable as a mean to help smoking cessation. In spite of the news above, there are still a lot of debatable uncertainties against them, namely:

1) Potential Health Risks?

- With the rapidly changing products and regulatory environment in the US and UK, there is no current production standards for ENDS, whilst there are various preparations produced by different manufacturers. As a result, the nature of the "e-juice" constituents and devices are unclear and typically unknown to the users whilst many are still worried given the relatively recent entry of ENDS into the market and the lengthy lag time for onset of many diseases of interest, such as cancer, conclusive evidence about the association of ENDS with such diseases will not be available for years or even decades.
- Current known physiological effects associated with ENDS use included mouth and throat irritation⁶.
- Some also concern that during the heating up of the glycerin and propylene glycol, the solvents commonly used in the "e-juices", these chemicals may decompose at high temperatures to low molecular carbonyl compounds including the carcinogens formaldehydes and acetaldehydes. There are also worries about the possible long term impact of propylene glycol and flavourings in these e-juices leading to bronchiolitis obliterans ("popcorn lung"), which being a serious and irreversible condition as the tiny air sacs in the lungs become scarred.

2) Risk of Nicotine Poisoning

 Nicotine within the "e-juices" is easily absorbable by skin during accidental spillage⁹, which can lead to overdosing and nicotine poisoning (especially in cases of larger-scaled spillage or smaller subjects, such as



toddlers or small animals). The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reported a dramatic increase in e-cigarette-related calls to poison centers in the recent years (the proportion of e-cigarette calls jumped from 0.3 percent in September 2010 to 41.7 percent in February 2014¹⁰). Furthermore, these poisoning cases should not be taken lightheartedly, and CDC reported a toddler died after ingesting liquid nicotine from e-cigarette in 2014¹¹.

3) Efficacy of ENDS as a mean for smoking cessation? From a WHO report issued in September 2014¹², it had commented that:

- Due to the product design constrains of ENDS, the degree of nicotine absorption through ENDS is highly users' behaviour-dependent (i.e. the length of puffs, depth of inhalation and frequency of use).
- Furthermore, due to the variable product quality and "e-juices" constituents, the nicotine delivery capacity also varies across different brands (i.e. they may not be high enough to reach a reliable therapeutic level to achieve effective and sustainable control of nicotine withdrawal symptoms).
- Although there had been anecdotal reports that indicated an undetermined proportion of ENDS users have quit smoking using these products, their efficacy had not been systemically reviewed yet. Hence in view of the limited evidence that did not allow firm conclusions to be reached, the WHO report suggested that at this stage, smokers should first be encouraged to guit smoking and nicotine addiction using a combination of already approved treatments (i.e. the already available conventional smoking cessation medications).

E-Cigarettes and Legislation in Hong Kong?

When considering our local environment, we also have to bear in mind the usage of e-cigarettes is also illegal in the sense that 13:

- Cigarette smoking (including e-cigarette) is banned in no smoking areas under the Smoking (Public Health) Ordinance (Chapter 371, Laws of Hong
- Under the Pharmacy and Poisons Ordinance (Chapter 138, Laws of Hong Kong), nicotine is a Part I poison. E-cigarette containing nicotine is regarded as pharmaceutical product and must be registered with the Pharmacy and Poisons Board before sale of distribution. Possession or sale of unregistered pharmaceutical product, and the possession or sale without authority of Part I poison, are both offences.

What should we tell our patients about e-cigarettes?

To sum up this discussion, as a family physician if we are approached by patients enquiring about ENDS as a means

of smoking cessation, with consideration of the current evidence, we may consider telling our patients that:

- We still do not know 1) if ENDS are completely safe, 2) which chemicals ENDS contain, 3) how much nicotine users are inhaling and 4) if ENDS are effective for smoking cessation based on controlled studies.
- The usage of ENDS in Hong Kong is currently still under a lot of legal constraints.
- At this juncture, our smokers should first be encouraged to quit smoking and nicotine addiction using a combination of already approved treatments (e.g. nicotine replacement therapy, non-nicotine pharmacotherapy) plus behavioural treatment to improve medication adherence and address addiction challenges.
- Whilst we should keep an open mind on ENDS until there is clear evidence of their safety and of their efficacy in helping people to quit smoking.

Interest Group in Mental Health & Psychiatry in Primary Care The 49th Meeting on 2 April 2016

The 49th Interest Group in Mental Health & Psychiatry in Primary Care Meeting was held on 2 April 2016. The invited speakers include Dr. Lau Wing Yin Verena, Senior Specialist (Educational Psychologist) of the Education Bureau and Dr. Eve Wong, Clinical Social Worker of the Adolescent Medical Centre of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital.

Meeting Themes:

- 1. Promoting Students' Mental Health: From an Educational Psychologist's Perspective by Dr. Lau Wing Yin, Verena
- 2. Understanding Suicidality in Young People by Dr. Eve Wong

A total of 52 Interest Group participants attended the meeting.

Learning Points

The news about adolescent suicide has made many people upset, including us family doctors. As the most frontline professionals safeguarding family's health, what can we do to improve the situation?

Dr. Verena Lau shared with us that most youngsters who completed suicide suffered from some forms of mental illness. The underlying issues behind can include mental health pathologies, family dysfunction, negative life events during childhood, stressful events etc. Moreover, different people have different vulnerability and the interplay between stressful life event and vulnerability is an important determinant of suicidal behaviours.

All frontline professionals, teachers and primary care doctors should be equipped with appropriate knowledge and skills to identify students and adolescents with depression or other mental health illness. Some youngsters may express directly by saying "let me die," while some may indicate their sense of hopelessness and helplessness by saying "I am tired of all these", "No one will care even if I die" etc.

Suicidal ideation should be assessed in young people showing signs of distress. Good communication with the suicidal youth by asking directly about their suicidal thoughts in a caring manner is the first crucial step of intervention. We can start the conversation by expressing our empathy, e.g. "I notice that you feel quite stressful recently", "maybe I cannot fully understand your feeling, but I can see that you are really frustrated and I really care about you and want to help you". It is not much helpful to argue with the patient about whether suicide is right or wrong, or try to give suggestions to solve their problems. It is more important to listen rather than giving opinions.

We should also have relevant resources at hand and refer the youth for further counselling and intervention.

Dr. Wong, a clinical social worker with training in art therapy and family therapy, presented her experience in working with young people with distress for more than 20 years. Children's and adolescents' thoughts and ideas about their frustration, distress, hopelessness, helplessness and suicidal ideation were expressed in various art works. She shared that many young people are affected by the political atmosphere while they are also influenced by other intra- and inter-personal issues. The multi-disciplinary team at the Adolescent Medical Centre of Queen Elizabeth Hospital, where Dr. Wong is working, welcomes referrals from the whole territory. They have received cases of depression, anxiety, eating disorders, complicated behavioural problems etc.

Self-reflections

School staff have frequent contact with students and adolescents but the quality of contact may not be good or intensive enough to open their hearts, or at least to create a dialogue on discussing their fears and stress. In the contrast, family doctors usually have trustful relationship with the family. We may be in the best position to identify young people at risk by exploring the distress they are facing or discussing with parents possible signs of distress in their adolescent sons and daughters, and more importantly, the proper ways to interact with them especially when they are stressful.

Let me share my experience of adding a brief discussion on stress when a middle-age came to my clinic for upper respiratory tract infection (URTI) symptoms.

Madam C visited my clinic in March with URTI symptoms. It was still in the peak season of flu, and her presentation was also typical influenza-like illness. She volunteered that she could not sleep well and felt malaise. On further exploration, she said she needed to supervise her daughter to prepare for school examination and so she could only sleep at late night. Then I took the opportunity to ask her about any signs of distress in her daughter. Fortunately she was coping quite well and did not show any significant behavioural signs as reported by her mother.

I believe that adding such a small piece of psychoeducation can facilitate the doctor-patient relationship as well as further help-seeking when problems really arise.

Next meeting

As the Hong Kong Primary Care Conference will be held on 4 June, therefore, the next meeting for the Interest group will be on 6 August 2016. Details would be announced in due course.

All members of the College are welcome and encouraged to present their cases and problems for discussions or role play. [Please do so 2 weeks beforehand for speakers to review, contact our secretary, at 2871 8899.] Again, those who are experienced can share, less experienced ones can benefit from participation. Our goal is to enhance our practical skills, promote early awareness and better management of mental health problems in our community.
