The busiest weekend of the College calendar has just passed. The 6^{th} Hong Kong Primary Care Conference happened on 4^{th} and 5^{th} June 2016. This was immediately followed by our 29^{th} Fellowship Conferment Ceremony and the 27^{th} Dr. Sun Yat Sun Oration.

The HKPCC was again a great success with nearly 500 attendees. The main theme was "A Flourishing Community- Our Vision in Primary Care" to address the present and future development of Primary Care in Hong Kong and worldwide. We were privileged to have Prof Michael Kidd, President of WONCA, Prof. Sophia Chan, Under Secretary for Food and Health Bureau and Prof Lam Tai Pong, Professor, Department of Family Medicine and Primary Care of the University of Hong Kong to deliver three high power plenary lectures. This year we even had two workshops on Communication Skills in Putonghua to address local and Greater China participants.

Prof. Michael Kidd's plenary speech touched on Bill Gates, the richest man in the world at the launch of "Primary HealthCare Performance Initiatives" last year. Mr. Gates mentioned "Hear argument about vertical and horizontal health care. The horizontal piece is the most important". Strengthening primary health care is the most viable way to close the treatment gap and ensure that all people in all communities get access to the health care they need. If you don't trust me, trust Bill! Who is the horizontal piece? We are!

Prof. Lam Tai Pong reminded us the consultative document in 2005 titled "Building a Healthy Tomorrow" and recommended the HKSAR government to promote family doctor concept. One of the important elements of the concept is: the doctor has the mindset and training, "training" of managing problems at the primary care level in a holistic way. Of course my wishful thinking is all

primary care doctors in Hong Kong will undergo training supervised by the College.

At the 29th Fellowship Conferment, there were 15 Diplomats of DFM, 26 Fellows passing the Conjoint Examination and 13 Exit Examination Fellows receiving their certificates. We were exuberant to witness one of our senior Fellows, Dr. Choi Kin celebrating the conferment of his son.

This year marks the $150^{\rm th}$ anniversary of the birth of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, an alumnus of the University of Hong Kong. We were honoured to have Prof. Gabriel M

Leung, Dean of Faculty of Medicine,

the University of Hong Kong and one of the very best medical speakers to deliver the 27th Dr. Sun Yat Sen Oration, titled: "What would Dr. Sun have done?" Initially we were wondering whether

Prof Leung was going to talk about politics or medicine. He skillfully mentioned "Medicine is a social science and politics is nothing else but medicine on a large scale. Medicine as a social science, as the science of human beings, has the obligation to point out problems and to attempt their theoretical solution; the politician, the practical anthropologist, must find the means for their actual solution." Prof. Leung also pointed out "Licenciate" was not equivalent to "Licensed to practice". The best example was Dr. Sun who had to quit Macao because under Portuguese regulations, no one not possessing a Portuguese diploma could legitimately practice there, and so he moved to Canton to work. His talk was meticulously

researched and a true reflection of the Hong Kong situation!

CUHK Honorary Fellow - A Citation



Dr Li Kwok-tung Donald

SBS, BA, MBBS, FHKCFP, FRACGP, FHKAM (Family Medicine), JP

It is said that medicine must, first and foremost, be human-oriented. In Chinese society, family comes first, and individuals are inseparable from their families. Family medicine, a 'people-first' medical science, has long been a fully-fledged practice in developed countries such as Australia and the UK, where it is regarded as the basis of community healthcare. Family doctors treat not just the disease but the patient, with an understanding of the whole family. In Western medicine, experience has proven this type of medicine to be the most efficient and cost-effective healthcare system for the community. Family doctors have become medical coordinators for the entire family, and frontline guardians of public health, with a far-reaching impact on the well-being of society as a whole. In this article we introduce the new Honorary Fellow of the Chinese University of Hong Kong conferred in 2016, who is also our familiar leader in Family Medicine - Dr. Donald Li.

Dr. Li Kwok-tung Donald is specialist in family medicine in private practice, as well as a leading expert in the field. With the lofty goal of easing the suffering of the sick, Dr. Li takes a hands-on approach to medical practice, posing as a role model for what an outstanding family doctor should be. Over the decades, he has been an ardent advocate for improving primary care, making significant contributions to family health promotion. Dr. Li graduated from Cornell University in 1975 with a Bachelor of Arts degree, and went on to obtain his Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery degrees from The University of Hong Kong (HKU) in 1980. He is currently the President of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine; Honorary Treasurer

and member-at-large of the World Organization of Family Doctors (WONCA) World Executive Council; and Censor of the Hong Kong College of Family Physicians. As a pioneer of family medicine in Hong Kong, Dr. Li has been an invited speaker at numerous local and international scientific conferences. He has also devoted his professional career to promoting the primary and family healthcare system in Hong Kong and the Asia Pacific region, achieving remarkable accomplishments along the way. His advocacy has helped advance the status of family medicine in Hong Kong, and the role of family doctors in the community. The care and attention family doctors give to the poor and sick, as well as their timely and appropriate treatment, has made the world a better place. As a champion of family medicine, Dr. Li deserves our applause for his remarkable efforts. As a humanitarian, Dr. Li is concerned not only about public health issues, but also the destruction brought about by natural disasters, and how society copes in their wake. He believes that in many Asian countries, there is insufficient resource allocation, scientific research and expertise to prepare for these risks. Hong Kong is a case in point. The general public is unaware of and unprepared for the destruction and turmoil associated with natural disasters. Should a disaster strikes, there is no mechanism in place to lead, coordinate recovery efforts, and conduct damage assessment. To support the government in contingency planning and disaster response training, Dr. Li advocated the establishment of the Hong Kong Jockey Club Disaster Preparedness and Response Institute (HKJC DPRI) under the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine. Through the funding



of the Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust, the Institute has worked closely with Disaster and Medical Humanitarian Response, Faculty of Medicine, The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK), in support of numerous postgraduate programmes and fellowships, contributing immensely to worldwide humanitarian efforts. We are also grateful to Dr. Li for the benefits brought to the University through these collaborations.

Dr. Li is currently a Honorary Fellow of the Hong Kong College of Family Physicians, Fellow of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine, Honorary Fellow of Royal Australian College of General Practitioners, Fellow of the UK's Faculty of Public Health, Fellow of the American College of Physicians, Honorary Fellow of the Royal College of General Practitioners in the UK, and Honorary Fellow of the Hong Kong College of Dental Surgeons. While practising medicine, Dr. Li has also dedicated much of his professional time to academia and teaching, including serving as a council member of the Cornell University; Honorary Professor of HKU's Li Ka Shing Faculty of Medicine; and Clinical Professor (honorary) of The Jockey Club School of Public Health and Primary Care at CUHK. Many medical students at the two major Universities of Hong Kong had the honour to be taught by this distinguished scholar.

Fan Zhongyan, a prominent literary figure during China's Song Dynasty, once said, "I would rather be a good doctor than a good minister." Both are noble professions, as a good minister improves social welfare and a good doctor saves lives. In fact, Dr. Li has been both a good doctor and a good minister.

Over the years, he has been devoted to community service, taking up responsibilities to help people in need and facilitate social betterment in both Hong Kong and mainland China. He has served in numerous posts at several governmental and public medical organisations, including Chairman of the Bauhinia Foundation Research Centre: council member of St John Ambulance Association: Chairman of the Board of Directors and Executive Committee for Hong Kong Sheng Kung Hui Welfare Council Limited; co-opted member of the Community Care Fund Task Force under the Commission on Poverty; and Chairman of the Governing Committee of the HKJC DPRI. Dr. Li has also served as Honorary Consultant to Shanghai's Huasan Hospital; member of the Board of Directors of the Hospital Authority; President of WONCA, Asia Pacific Region; President of the Hong Kong College of Family Physicians; member of the Greater Pearl River Delta Business Council; and member of the Board of Stewards of the Hong Kong Jockey Club. In recognition of the huge contribution Dr. Li has made to society, the HKSAR Government appointed him Justice of the Peace in 2006, and honoured him with the Silver Bauhinia Star in 2011.

In his 10-year stint on the Board of Stewards of HKJC, from 2004 to 2013, Dr. Li helped with the management of HKJC's Charities Trust. Built on his tremendous expertise in medical science and his experience in medical operations, Dr. Li was able to provide evaluation of and insights into numerous medical grant and donation applications. He also helped establish Cadenza, an HKJC initiative for seniors aimed at coping with the issue of the aging population of Hong Kong. During this period, Dr. Li helped CUHK secure numerous grants and donations from HKJC. He also provided full support for the development of CUHK's private teaching hospital. His contribution to CUHK will be remembered in perpetuity.

In recognition of a good doctor and minister who takes the suffering of patients to heart, has contributed immensely to Hong Kong's family medicine, and provided tremendous help for the construction of CUHK's private teaching hospital, Dr. Donald Li was awarded as an Honorary Fellow of the Chinese University of Hong Kong in 2016...

The House Management Committee is comprised of the Executives of the HKCFP Council, namely the President, two Vice-Presidents, Honorary Secretary and Honorary Treasurer. Their work is assisted by the General Manager, Ms. Erica So, who offers tremendous help to the doctors.

The House Management Committee is responsible for the recruitment of staff in the Secretariat, staff deployment to the various Boards and Committees, staff appraisal and staff welfare. Here I would like to thank our staff on behalf of the House Management Committee for their dedicated attitude and assiduity in face of these often intimidating workloads.

When we talk to them, we understand that our friendly staff are more than happy to provide a good and efficient service to members of our College, and help them to solve any problems that may arise in College activities. If you would like to meet them, the Hong Kong Primary Care Conference, the Conferment Ceremony and the Annual Dinner, when they all be present, are good opportunities to do so and thank them personally if you wish to do. I am sure they will be very happy with your appreciation of their hard work.



Screening and Primary Prevention of Colorectal Cancer

Colorectal cancer is the most common cancer in Hong Kong in 2013. According to Hong Kong Cancer Registry, there were 4,769 new cases (16.5%) in 2013. The number of colorectal cancer death cases was 1,981 (14.6% of all cancer mortality) in 2013. Over 90% of new cases occurred in people aged 50 or above.

A pilot colorectal cancer screening programme is going to be launched by the Hong Kong Government in the third quarter of 2016. This 3-year pilot programme will offer colorectal cancer screening to Hong Kong residents aged 61 to 70. It involves screening target individuals by faecal immunochemical test (FIT) and for further colonoscopy if FIT result is positive.

This article aims to discuss different screening options, screening strategies and primary prevention of colorectal cancer.

Screening options

Faecal occult blood test

Faecal occult blood test is a non-invasive screening test and it reduces colorectal cancer mortality by 15-33%. The newer faecal immunochemical test (FIT) has advantages over the conventional guaiac-based faecal occult blood test as FIT does not require diet and medication restriction before testing. FIT also has higher sensitivity and better overall performance than conventional faecal test. Patients with positive faecal occult blood test should proceed to colonoscopy for further investigation.

Flexible sigmoidoscopy

Observational study has demonstrated flexible sigmoidoscopy might reduce colorectal cancer risk by 45%. The perforation risk for screening flexible sigmoidoscopy is only 0.01%. It allows polypectomy and biopsy. It also has the advantage over colonoscopy that sedation is often not required. However, it only examines the distal colon and thus lesions in the proximal colon can be missed. The sensitivity and specificity of flexible sigmoidoscopy for detecting advanced colonic lesions were 78% and 84% respectively.

Colonoscopy

Observational study has also demonstrated colonoscopy might reduce colorectal cancer risk by 73% and 91% for women and men respectively. The clinical significant complications that requiring medication intervention (e.g. bleeding, cardiovascular events) or perforation risk for screening colonoscopy is 0.1-0.2%. Similar to flexible sigmoidoscopy, it allows polypectomy and biopsy. It has the advantage of being able to examine the whole colon. The procedure usually requires sedation. The sensitivity and specificity of colonoscopy for detecting colorectal cancer were >90% and 99%, respectively.

Virtual colonoscopy (or CT colonoscopy)

When compared with traditional colonoscopy, virtual colonoscopy has the advantages of being minimally invasive and not requiring sedation. Depending on the size of the polyp, virtual colonoscopy has a sensitivity of 48% to 93%. The specificity ranges from 92 to 97%. The disadvantages

of virtual colonoscopy include radiation exposure and not permitting biopsy or polypectomy. Currently there is no sufficient evidence to suggest that virtual colonoscopy screening can reduce colorectal cancer mortality.

Screening for average risk individuals

The Cancer Expert Workgroup on Cancer Prevention and Screening (CEWG) of the Government's Cancer Coordinating Committee recommends screening for individuals aged 50 to 75 with average risk in Hong Kong:

- 1. annual or biennial faecal occult blood test, or
- flexible sigmoidoscopy every 5 years, or
- 3. colonoscopy every ten years

Screening for high risk individuals

The CEWG recommends the following screening strategies of colorectal cancer for specific high risk individuals:

- For carriers of mutated gene of Hereditary Nonpolyposis Colorectal Cancer (HNPCC): screening by colonoscopy every 1-2 years from age 25
- For carriers of mutated gene of Familial Adenomatous Polyposis (FAP): screening by flexible sigmoidoscopy every 2 years from age 12
- For persons having 1 or more first degree relatives diagnosed to have colorectal cancer at or below 60 years of age: screening by colonoscopy every 3 to 5 years and should begin at age 40 or 10 years prior to the age at diagnosis of the youngest affected relative, but not earlier than 12 years of age

Primary prevention of colorectal cancer

Family physicians should advise patients for the following as primary prevention strategies for colorectal cancer:

- increase intake of dietary fibre (e.g. fibre from fruits and vegetables) and decrease consumption of red and processed meat
- increase physical activities
- maintain healthy body weight
- avoid or quit tobacco smoking
- avoid or limit consumption of alcoholic drinks

及後,衛生署基層醫療統籌處處長王曼霞醫生分 享了署方於2016年3月進行的病人問卷調查。問 卷調查結果顯示有58.9%病人願意向家庭醫生 分享心理情緒問題,而有22.3%病人會向家庭醫 生提及心理情緒問題。另外,問卷調查亦發現有 41.8%病人有家庭醫生。而有家庭醫生的病人比 較沒有家庭醫生的會較願意 (70.2% vs 50%)及向 家庭醫生實際提出 (29.8% vs 16.9%) 心理情緒問 題。病人與家庭醫生的良好關係,病人對家庭醫 生的信任及有足夠的診症時間會使病人決定會 否向家庭醫生提出心理情緒問題。

除了衛生署病人問卷調查分 享外,香港家庭醫學學院林 永和醫生亦邀請了自已的病 人趙女士及麥先生與活動司 儀鄧梓峰先生作分享。林醫 生作為趙女士的家庭醫生已 經十二載,她分享了林醫生如 何與她一同處理工作上的精 神壓力。她對林醫生的信任 及致令她能將信用卡交與林 醫生,藉此處理趙女士以購 物作減壓的習慣。而麥先生 一家四代都以林醫生作為家 庭醫生。麥先生、麥太太的父 母、麥太婆婆、姨媽、舅舅、 他們的女兒等,若身體或情 緒上有狀況都會第一時間找 林醫生。他們已視林醫生為 家人,會將內心的秘密向林 醫生如長輩般分享。林醫生 亦十分開心能與病人坦誠交 流,了解他們的喜怒哀樂。





Learning Points

This year's third Dermatology Interest Group meeting was held on 7 May. The invited speaker is Dr. Ho Ka Keung. Dr. Ho graduated from CUHK in 1991. He completed specialist training in Dermatology and Venereology in 2002. He worked as consultant dermatologist in Grandpire Medical Clinic from November 2004 onwards. He had special interest in inflammatory dermatosis and cosmetic dermatology. With the use of various clinical cases and clinical photos, Dr Ho gave us an interesting talk on "Common Dermatoses in Summer and Their Management".

Summer in Hong Kong is usually wet and humid. It is easy for a lot of dermatoses to flare up. Three common dermatoses, namely fungal infection, acne vulgaris and atopic dermatitis are the most commonly presenting diseases in summer.

Superficial Fungal Infection

Superficial fungal infection is very common in Hong Kong. Male and elderly patients are commonly affected. Vascular disease, diabetes mellitus and obesity are the three most prevalent predisposing factors.

During the seminar, common presentations of superficial fungal infection were discussed with the help of various clinical photos. Dr. Ho particularly mentioned about steroid usage. Steroid cream is commonly used in our community. Typical features of ringworm can be partially hidden by steroid cream. This can further delay the correct fungal diagnosis.

Treatment of superifical fungal infection includes topical antifungals like imidazoles (e.g. clotrimazole) and allylamines (e.g. terbinafine) and systemic antifungals. Figure A shows a summary of comparison of treatment duration and mycological cure rate of topical and systemic antifungal in treating tinea infection.

In patient with renal impairment (serum Cr>300 or CrCl < 50ml/ min), the dose of systemic antifungal should be halved.

Acne Vulgaris and other acneform eruptions

Acne vulgaris is the commonest presentation of adolescents and youth in dermatology clinic. Four commonest pathologic factors in acne vulgaris are:

- Increase in sebum secretion caused by androgens
- Follicular plugging which leads to comedones
- Bacterial overgrowth by Propionibacterium acnes
- Tissue inflammation which caused scarring and post inflammatory hyperpigmentation, as determined by genetics and gender.

Acne commonly occurs at face, chest and back. Superficial lesions include open and closed comedones, papules and pustules. Deep lesions include nodules and cysts. There may be secondary changes such as excoriations, pigmented macules,

Management depends on the severity of disease. Topical treatment is for mild and superficial lesions. Oral antibiotics and hormonal therapy are used to treat moderate acne. Oral isotretinoin is reserved for severe acne. The main side effects of oral isoretinoin include teratogenicity, xerosis, chelitis, liver function impairment, hyperlipidemia, joint pain, headache and alopecia. Other forms of treatment include Intense Pulsed light (IPL) and laser therapy.

Atopic Dermatitis (AD)

Atopic dermatitis is the most common type of endogenous eczema whereas the most common type of exogenous eczema is housewife dermatitis. It is characterized by recurrent attacks of itchy eruptions all over the body. The rash symmetrically affects the face and flexural areas.

Atopic dermatitis affects more than 3% of all infants. It runs a relapsing course and most of the children have their first attack below 5 years old. Up to 70% of AD children may remit by the end of puberty. Less than 10% of patients started to have AD in adult, called adult onset eczema, where prognosis is fair to poor.

It is found that the underlying cause of AD is defective skin barrier and dysfunction of the immune system in particular T-helper lymphocytes. Impaired skin barrier function may be caused by filaggrin gene mutation, abnormal protease activation and lipid dysfunction. All these factors may trigger the exposure of allergens and hyperactive immune responses that stimulate the itchy scratch cycle.

Unlike other medical disease AD is purely a clinical diagnosis and no single test or investigation is unique to AD. The clinical features of acute AD are characterized by symmetrical erythematous macules, papules and vesicles. Lichenification and hyperpigmentation are the hallmark of chronic eczema. Exacerbation factors of AD include weather, food allergens, aeroallergens, hot water bath, soap and emotions.

The cornerstone treatments of AD are liberal use of emollient and topical steroid. Other forms of treatments in severe AD are systemic antibiotics and immunosuppressive agents such as azathioprine and cyclosporine. Phototherapy can also be used in selected patients. Topical calcineurin inhibitors such as Protopics and Elidel are the second-line treatments for AD patients who were aged more than two years and six months, respectively.

In the discussion part, two of our trainees presented three cases commonly seen in our clinic. The first case is a mid-age lady with diabetic dermopathy, the second case is a young adult presented with rash over face, ear, scalp and palms associated with URTI, and the last case is a case of pigmented nodule in an elderly patient. Dr. Ho reviewed all cases and gave his comments for each case.
