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Message from the President





Congratulations to all of the proud Family Doctors in Hong Kong! World Family Doctor Day (WFDD) – 19th May - was first declared by WONCA in 2010 and it has become a day to highlight the role and contribution of family doctors around the world. The event has gained momentum each year and it is a wonderful opportunity to acknowledge the central role of our specialty in the delivery of personal, comprehensive and continuing care for all our patients.

To celebrate this day, the College has a series of activities. ten episodes of a TV series: 'My Family Doctor 2017', produced by Radio Television Hong Kong, in collaboration with the Primary Care Office, Department of Health, which has been broadcasted since March 2017 and will conclude in May 2017. We have a video clip to tell the public about WFDD and the role of family doctor in the community and family. During the week of WFDD, the video clip will be advertised in MTR stations, buses, and outdoor screens in popular areas around Hong Kong. An article will be published in the local newspaper Headline Daily on 19 May, which will showcase and interview with the College's representatives. Finally, three episodes of live RTHK radio programmes on the "Past, Present and Future of the Hong Kong College of Family Physicians" are happening in May and the last episode will be on 19 May. Stay tuned!

By 2041, nearly one third of Hong Kong's population will be aged 65 and above, and the demand for End of Life Care in the community will be enormous. A HKD 300 million three-year project funded by the Jockey Club has been in operation since 2016. The success of the project will hinge on the involvement of primary care doctors. I met Prof Cecilia Chan, Chair Professor in Health and Social Work, the University of Hong Kong, and her team last month. We all agree primary care doctor involvement is essential in this enduring end-of-life programme. The College will start by recruiting 50 doctors who are interested in providing the service in the community. A short training course will commence once we have this number. I encourage anyone who is interested in joining this meaningful palliative care training programme to submit their application when the course is announced.

We now have a new Chief Executive for Hong Kong SAR, Mrs Carrie Lam. Interestingly almost one-third of Mrs Lam's 36 years of public service has been closely related to Hong Kong's medical services. She was previously posted to the Department of Health as its Assistant Director of Administration, tasked to implement recommendations in the Primary Health Care Report entitled "Health For All by the Year 2000". Over the past week, she has spoken on her future healthcare policy and made five valid points on: primary care, innovation and technology, cross professional collaboration, healthcare financing and manpower. If these sound familiar it could be that they were all mentioned in my previous messages. She said "Our healthcare system will rise on health promotion and disease prevention and shifting more emphasis to primary healthcare and keeping Hong Kong people especially the senior people happy and healthy so they could all celebrate ageing instead of worrying about ageing". I do hope Mrs Lam is a lady of her word and keeps investing the smart Hong Kong money on Primary Care and Family Medicine. She has certainly given Primary Care a new lease of life!

Dear Members.

RE: MCHK CME Programme for Practising Doctors who are not taking CME Programme for Specialists

(ver. 20 April 2017)

Members starting the next MCHK Cycle from 1 July 2017 and opt for using HKAM as your MCHK CME administrator through HKCFP will have the associated administrative charge waived.

Given the College Secretariat has now taken up the processing of MCHK CME record for members who use the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine (HKAM) as their Administrator for the said programme, **the associated administration charge will be waived provided that prior written consent is received by the College Secretariat**.

Interested members please note the following points for your consent:

- 1. MCHK registrants have the responsibility to liaise with your current CME Administrator (HKMA, DU, and DH) for the necessary procedures in relation to the change of the CME Administrator.
- 2. As required by HKAM, transfer of the CME Points from the previous CME Administrator can be arranged normally only after a cycle of programme has completed.
- 3. In case of any discrepancy of the accredited CME Points between the College and the other Administrators, the College reserves the right of the final decision on the accredited CME Points.

As the College is required to report the CME Points to HKAM every 6 months,

- 4. Members who will attend overseas conference are required to submit the record of the attendance to the Academy for CME Accreditation within one month of the completion of the conference.
- 5. Members who are going to undertake self-study are requested to submit the details of the program within one month of the completion of the self-study.
- 6. MCHK CME registrants should continue to sign on the respective HKAM CME attendance record sheet for CME record purpose as usual. To help the College secretariat distinguish College members from others, please identify yourself by entering your HKCFP membership number or simply putting "HKCFP" in the column of HKAM

The captioned free service is for our College members only. Interested members can download the required Registration Consent Form at www.hkcfp.org.hk > Download > CME/CPD and return the completed form to our College Secretariat at cmecpd@hkcfp.org.hk before 23rd June 2017 to facilitate the necessary arrangement.

While the service is free of charge for all College members, submission may not be accredited if one fails to comply with the above-mentioned points. As usual, late submission may not be processed. Also, MCHK CME record may not be updated if one fails to update MCHK CME Administrator timely. In case of any discrepancy of the accredited CME Points, the College's decision is final.

Diploma in Family Medicine (HKCFP) 2017-18

The Board is pleased to announce that the Diploma Course in Family Medicine (DFM) organized by The Hong Kong College of Family Physicians will commence in July 2017.

The course consists of FIVE modules. Modules I & II will be delivered by Local Distance Learning. Modules III, IV & V consist of lectures, seminars, tutorials, workshops and clinical attachments. The whole course requires ONE year of part-time studies.

Details of the course are as follows:

1. Objectives:

- i) To provide knowledgeable, pragmatic and structured teaching in Family Medicine for medical practitioners
- ii) To encourage professional development of practising medical practitioners and to provide an intermediate step to fellowship qualifications in Family Medicine

Public Activities to Celebrate the 40th Anniversary of Our College

2007 marks the 40th Anniversary of HKCFP. To celebrate this significant milestone and to let the public to know about this, the Public Affairs Subcommittee of the 40th Anniversary Celebration Organizing Committee has organized several public activities, and two important events are a series of 4 public health talks, and a series of 3 weekly radio programmes in 精靈一點 of RTHK Radio 1.

1. Public Health Talks 2017

The Chinese title of the Public Health Talk Series is 「更致全康四十載 春夏秋冬健康來」. As the title implies, the series of four public health talks will follow several important themes that have seasonal variations, and the varieties of the contents demonstrate the unique and comprehensive role of family physicians in handling different health problems.

The 'Spring' talk, with the theme of 'Allergic Rhinitis and Asthma', and 'Cardiovascular Health', was already held on 25 March 2017. The 'Summer' talk was held on 13 May 2017, just prior to the 'World Family Doctor's Day' on 19 May, which have the themes on 'Heat Stroke and Sunshine Protection' by Dr. Ken Ho Ka-ming, and 'Travellers' Health' by Dr. Loretta Chan Wing-yan. The corresponding themes will be 'Eczema and Skin Care' / 'Depression' in 'Autumn', and 'Common Children Infection' / 'Flu and Other Vaccines' in 'Winter'.

2. Radio Programme in「精靈一點」of RTHK Radio 1

We will also have a series of three radio shows on the popular radio programme 精靈一點 of RTHK Radio 1, on three consecutive Fridays of 5 May, 12 May, and 19 May 2017. Through this well-received radio programme, public will know more about the past history, the present status, and the future development of Our College. Our role in and contributions to the health care system, in particular in managing Communicable Diseases, Noncommunicable Diseases, and Mental Health Problems, will also be illustrated.

Speakers and themes of the three programmes:

- **5 May 2017:** Dr. Stephen Foo, Our Censor, and Dr. Lau Ho-lim, Our Vice-President, talked about the establishment and history of College, and review the role of family physicians in the management of different Communicable Diseases.
- **12 May 2017:** Dr. Angus Chan, Our President, and Dr. Ngan Po-lun, Chairman of Public Education Committee, elaborated on the current structure and situation of College, and shared our holistic and personalized approach in managing various Non-Communicable Diseases.

HA's GOPC PPP Programme to Reach All of HK Soon!

The General Outpatient Clinic Public-Private Partnership Programme (GOPC PPP) was launched by the Hospital Authority (HA) in mid-2014. Initially in three pilot districts, it has now been extended to 16 (out of 18), and will be territory-wide by April 2018.

The GOPC PPP aims to:

- a) Provide choice to patients for receiving primary care services from the private sector;
- b) Enhance patient access to primary care services;
- c) Promote the family doctor concept;
- d) Help the HA manage demand for general outpatient service; and
- e) Foster the development of the territory-wide electronic Health Record Sharing System (eHRSS).

We are grateful for the valuable advice and views of the Hong Kong College of Family Physicians (HKCFP) on the Programme.

- 1) Service Fee up to \$3,034 per patient per year (Enrolled doctors may receive a maximum payment of \$3,034 per patient per year covering a maximum of 10 consultations.)
- 2) Elderly Health Care Vouchers can be used for non-Programme services
- 3) A territory-wide programme supported by investment returns from the \$10 billion HA PPP Fund
- 4) Patients can choose enrolled doctors as family doctors across all relevant districts
- 5) Continual support by HA's Help Desk & Programme hotline

Friendly IT

- 1) Easy IT platform facilitating clinical documentation and claim for reimbursement
- 2) Electronic drug ordering, with status tracking function
- 3) Allow delegation of administrative work to enrolled doctors' clinic staff

Drug Arrangements

- 1) Enrolled doctors may purchase Programme Drugs from designated drug suppliers at Programme prices
- 2) All Programme Drugs supplied shall generally have an expiry date of at least 18 months from the date of delivery
- 3) One free delivery per drug supplier per calendar month

GOPC PPP - Programme Highlights

Clinically stable patients having hypertension and / or diabetes mellitus (with or without hyperlipidemia) currently taken care of by HA general outpatient clinics (GOPC), are invited in phases, for voluntary participation. All registered medical practitioners are welcome to participate in this Programme, in accordance with the Programme's Terms and Conditions.

Up to end of March 2017, the Programme has provided over 78,000 consultations to participating patients, with around \$18 million of service fees disbursed.

Under mutual agreement, individual patients may receive further services and treatment at their own expenses. Patients who have participated in the Elderly Health Care Voucher Scheme can meet such additional charges from their Health Care Voucher accounts.

Upon the roll-out of the Programme to 18 districts, it is planned that around 35,000 patients can participate in the Programme.







GOPC PPP - Enhancing Primary Care

Primary care is the first contact point in the healthcare system, not only providing episodic illness care, but also comprehensive, continuing, coordinated and person-centred healthcare in the context of family and community. Whilst facing an uprising prevalence of chronic diseases, patients with chronic diseases are now heavily relying on public healthcare services under the current system. Yet, in the existing healthcare system, about 70% of the outpatient consultations are provided by the private sector whilst the remaining some 30% by the public sector. Through PPP, there is a high potential to tap the available capacity and capability of the private sector in managing more patients with chronic diseases. This will facilitate better disease prevention, early detection of health issues, timely intervention and personalized care; leading to better health maintenance and thus ultimately help achieve healthy ageing in the community.

Primary care also stresses the establishment of longterm continuous relationship between a patient and his/her family doctor. The family doctor concept allows a much more direct and continuous relationship with individual patients, as family doctors may provide better continuity and integration of holistic care through the access of lifelong health records of individual patients thereby also facilitating referral and follow-up of cases between different levels of care. Family doctors are also better positioned to carry out preventive care via enhanced public health education, promotion and protection of well-being as well as to improve patients' quality of life through holistic care. Currently, "doctorshopping" is a fairly common phenomenon, where patients seek medical care on the same health problem from multiple doctors in parallel. Also, a lot of patients are simultaneously seen by both the private and public sectors. Such behaviors bring a major drawback in affecting the continuity of patient care. GOPC PPP can encourage patients to build a long-term patient-doctor relationship with one family doctor, who will take care of the patient's chronic, episodic and other health problems; thus actualizing the family doctor concept.

Being our key partner in the medical professional field, the HA looks forward to working with the HKCFP to enhance the Programme further and, more importantly, to join in the overall enhancement of primary care for Hong Kong in the long term.





Necrotising Fasciitis - Prevention, Clinical Alertness and Earl Detection are the Keys

Introduction

Necrotising fasciitis is quite an uncommon medical condition in our community, affecting patients of different age groups, but once we miss the diagnosis the result is always lethal. The early diagnosis of necrotising fasciitis is always a huge challenge, as the early symptoms are always nonspecific and the progress of disease is unexpectedly rapid. Recently, there had been a local case who died from necrotising fasciitis due to G Streptococcal infection after her open wound was splashed by flushing toilet water in a public washroom. Let us look into this disease again, trying our best to take early attention to prevent the most disastrous outcome.

Causative organisms and classifications

There is a wide spectrum of bacteria causing necrotising fasciitis. The most common causative organism is Group A Streptococcus. Other common causative organism includes Klebsiella, Clostridium, Escherichia coli, Staphylococcus aureus and Aeromonas hydrophila.

They are commonly classified into two types according to microbiology:

Type I disease (polymicrobial) is mainly caused by anaerobic bacteria and streptococci other than serogroup A

Type II disease (monomicrobial) is caused by Group A streptococci (GAS)

At risk patients

- Patients with a break in their epidermis, by events such as minor trauma, abrasion, cut, contusion, laceration, bite, burn, subcutaneous injection, incision
- Patients with immunodeficiencies such as diabetes mellitus, renal insufficiency, chemotherapy, malignancy, alcoholism, malnutrition, corticosteroid use
- Diabetes is a particularly important risk factor; several forms of necrotising infection have been seen more frequently in diabetics

 Although the above risk factors may make a patient more prone to necrotizing fasciitis, however this condition could also happen in a relatively healthy person.

Symptoms to be noticed

Above all, a high index of clinical suspicion is the main key of early detection of necrotising fasciitis

Early symptoms

- Some pain in the local area of the injury, or diffuse pain, and the pain is usually disproportionate to the injury
- Redness and warm swollen skin, sometimes with non specific numbness
- Flu like symptoms such as fever, nausea, diarrhoea, general malaise, weakness
- Dehydration
- There is usually a combination of symptoms at presentation

Advanced symptoms (skin ischaemia)

- The pain tissue begins to swell and may show a purplish rash
- The affected tissue may begin to have large black blisters filled with dark fluid
- The skin may start to be necrotic, some may have foul odour, exudate and gas in tissue

Critical symptoms (late stage)

Patient in septic shock with heavy drop of blood pressure and unconsciousness

Diagnosis

- Diagnosis is mostly by clinical, sometimes with the help of laboratory tests
- The gold standard of confirmation of necrotising fasciitis is by tissue biopsy obtained at the time of wound exploration and surgical debridement, but often this kind of diagnosis is too late
- There have been studies on evaluating the sensitivity and specificity of Laboratory Risk Indicator for Necrotising Fasciitis (LRINEC), which is a tool used to help in distinguishing between necrotising



and non-necrotising soft tissue infections. The original study found that a LRINEC score ≥ 6 had a sensitivity of approximately 90% and a specificity of approximately 95%. However, subsequent studies of the LRINEC score yielded lower sensitivity of around 60% and specificity in the 80% range. A LRINEC score of ≥ 6 could be used as a potential tool to rule in necrotizing fasciitis, but a score < 6 should not be used to rule out the diagnosis.

Risk category of having necrotising fasciitis: Low <6; intermediate 6-7; high 8

Treatment

Treatment consists of early and aggressive surgical exploration and debridement of necrotic tissue, together with broad-spectrum empiric antibiotic as well as haemodynamic support. As there is literature evidence that the use of antibiotic therapy without debridement is associated with a mortality rate approaching 100 percent, once we had clinical suspicion that a patient suffering from necrotising fasciitis, we should promptly admit the patient for urgent surgical consultation, and for early exploration and debridement.

Prevention

Good personal hygiene with proper hand washing, as well as good wound care, are the best ways of prevention of the disease:

- Wash hands properly with soap and water. If hand washing facilities are not available, 70-80% alcoholbased handrub can be used.
- Keep draining or open wounds covered with clean, dry bandages until healed.
- Don't delay first aid for even minor, non-infected wounds like blisters, scrapes, or any break in the skin
- If one has an open wound or active infection, going to swimming pools, other water facilities or natural bodies of water (e.g., lakes, rivers, oceans) should be delayed until the conditions are healed.
- Wear thick gloves when handling raw shellfish or other seafood.

從大學時代起,我就一直也很想當家庭醫生。回想大學四年級的「家庭醫學課」除講堂和習作 外,還包括一些「師徒制」的臨床實習機會。在機緣際遇下,我被派往兩位家庭醫生的診所觀 摩他們工作。這兩位「師傅」,各有不同的處事方式和專長,卻正因家庭醫生的身份,不同社 會階層,無論男女老幼的病人都會找他們去解決問題和分享自己的憂慮。

當年,我經常有個疑問:「這些家庭醫生都深受病人歡迎和信賴,而他們的『魅力』和吸引之 處又源於什麼?|多年後,成為了家庭醫學專科醫生的自己,開始參透箇中玄機:

- 1) 家庭醫生診症時很注重病人的「白米飯」,也即是簡稱為R.I.C.E.的求診原因(Reasons of consultation)、病人對自身健康的固有想法與觀念(Ideas and beliefs)、病人對病情產生的 顧慮(Concerns)及對診症的期望(Expectations)。習慣了解病人的R.I.C.E.令我們做事時 常「以病人為本,急別人所急」(也即是英式諺語的"Think in others' shoes"),繼而令我們 的治療計劃更為貼近病人心意。
- 2) 家庭醫學着重全面(comprehensive)、持續(continuity)以及與人協調(coordinative)的全人 照顧(holistic care)。所以我們常要多角度思考,為每位病人周詳地計劃短、中、長期的治 療方案。

正正就是我們為病人計劃「完美Package」(最理想的配套)的「天性」,所以從工作中更容易 得到病人的信任和認同。今天的我深深明白,和病人的良好互信關係(rapport)得來不易,並常 提醒自己要好好珍惜。

藉此希望病人能明白我們家庭醫生的苦心,在問診時能「打開心窗」,把心中對病情的擔憂和 顧慮向我們和盤托出,使我們能了解更多,令整個診症也變得更「貼心」。
