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Message from the President



I just spent my Easter break at Nanning for the 5th Cross-Straits Medicine Exchange Association Conference. Nanning is the capital city of Guangxi in southern China. It is known as the "Green City" because of its abundance of lush subtropical foliage.

Our delegates were headed by Prof. Donald Li and Prof. Cindy Lam who are the Chairman and Vice-Chairlady of the Exchange Association respectively. Prof. William Wong,

Drs. Jun Liang, Edwin Chan, Alex Zhang were all there to support. Dr. Dao Man Chi represented our Young Doctors Committee and Dr. Chiang Lap Kin received the best paper award. We had witnessed the second batch of three recipients of HKCFP Donald Li Scholarship. They were from Henan, Shanghai and Beijing and had previously attended the training course organized by the College. They will have the opportunity to attend the Family Medicine clinics at university, public and private sectors in Hong Kong for exchange of knowledge and ideas.

China has well recognised that Family Medicine will improve the health of population, lower the cost and result in less heath inequality. The latest important China policy is to enhance the training of family doctors, speed up the infrastructure building of primary healthcare and promote the contract services of family doctors. The gatekeeper role and the importance of family doctor in dealing with episodic, chronic diseases, preventive care and the whole person healthcare management are highlighted. The training at the moment is 5+3+X. 5 is the basic medical school training. 3 is a Master degree in clinical medicine or postgraduate training in Family Medicine but unfortunately the trainees are mainly spending time in hospital training with very little community exposure! "X" is yet the undetermined future training to become a specialist FM doctor. Continuing medical education CME and continuing profession development are encouraged.

I was most impressed when the senior official from the National Health and Family Planning Commission openly highlighted the problems with uneven distribution of resources, training standard and quality, low wages, lack of promotion and professional development that the primary healthcare system is facing. The government understands the problems and is changing its policy to fulfil the primary healthcare need of the most populated country in the world. Not an easy task! At this very moment, China has 209,000 family doctors. By 2020, the ratio is 2-3 family doctors per 10,000 people and by 2030, the ratio is 5 per 10,000 people meaning there will be 650,000 family doctors.

To put a figure on how many trained Family Physicians is needed in Hong Kong, I have taken a leaf from the National policy of one family doctor per 2000 people. Hong Kong with a population of about 7.5 million requires 3750 trained Family Physicians to sustain the primary healthcare system. If the average working life of a doctor is 40 years, we need to train at least 94 Family Physicians per annum. The actual figure is much higher as some doctors may have a shorter working life, or are doing part-time job! When we talk about the manpower, I don't know what the fuss is about regarding the proposed limited registration increasing to 3 years in order to attract more talent coming to work in Hong Kong. All those that voiced out Hong Kong had over supply of doctors 15 years ago have all gone submerged! I remember 4 years ago I had dinner with the Chief Executive of Hospital Authority, Controller for Centre for Health Protection, Dean of Faculty of Medicine HKU, a Professor in Dermatology and we were all non-Hong Kong graduates. A shy Director of Department of Health at the same table mentioned she was transferred to HKU after a first year medical school in UK. I was a Glasgow graduate from a very traditional medical school and Glasgow is home to one of the Royal Colleges in postgraduate training in UK. In the 1980s and 1990s, the National Health Services was staffed by a lot of overseas doctor to work at junior doctor level in order to sustain the UK health services. The attraction to Glasgow was to provide decent postgraduate training and these overseas doctors all planned to achieve UK postgraduate qualification. When I was working as senior house officer at the Glasgow Royal Infirmary, there was always an "international football team" with doctors from Australia, Malaysia, Africa, India and the now war torn countries like Iraq, Libya, Syria at the ward round. I did not just learn from the Scottish system but these overseas doctors had taught me to become a better doctor. I learnt from their goodies and their mistakes.

Hong Kong has a very high standard in Medicine and there is no doubt postgraduate training can be offered to attract overseas graduates to come here for training and services. A lot of overseas graduates are Hong Kong SAR citizens and have achieved postgraduate intermediate qualification as recognised by the 15 academic Colleges of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine. These are the ones the Hospital Authority should target for and if in doubt seek the opinion from Education Committee of the Academy. Ultimately if these doctors opt to work beyond their limited registration, they still have to sit for the licentiate examination but exemption can be given to the specialty they have previously contributed in part of the clinical examination and the internship year. We all know in breeding from two origins will increase genetic disorder. Genetic diversity is good for a healthy clan and healthcare system!






Result of Readers' Survey 2017


The survey was conducted in September and October 2017. 49 questionnaires were returned. The results are summarized and presented as below.



3. Rate the following columns in FP Links (Total returns: 49)




4. Preference in reading the FP Links if the electronic version is available 45 responses

Diploma in Family Medicine (HKCFP) 2018-2019

The Board is pleased to announce that the Diploma Course in Family Medicine (DFM) organized by The Hong Kong College of Family Physicians will commence in July 2018.

The course consists of FIVE modules. Modules I & II will be delivered by Local Distance Learning. Modules III, IV & V consist of lectures, seminars, tutorials, workshops and clinical attachments. The whole course requires ONE year of part-time studies.

Details of the course are as follows:

RE: MCHK CME Programme for Practising Doctors who are not taking CME Programme for Specialists (ver. 20 March 2018)

For members who have submitted the consent form earlier, please ignore this message

Members who start the next MCHK Cycle from **1 July 2018** and who opt to use the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine (HKAM) as their MCHK CME administrator through HKCFP will have the associated **administrative charge waived**.

Given the College Secretariat has now taken up the processing of MCHK CME record for members who use HKAM as their Administrator for the programme, the associated administration charge will be waived provided that prior written consent is received by the College Secretariat.

Interested members should note the following points:

- 1. MCHK registrants have the responsibility to liaise with your current CME Administrator (HKMA, DU, and DH) for the necessary procedures in relation to change of the CME Administrator.
- 2. Change of CME Administrator from other CME Administrators to HKAM via College can be arranged after **ONE Cycle Year of programme has completed**, given that HKAM was not the administrator of your previous MCHK CME Cycle. Please provide the CME Report for the Cycle Year(s) completed under other CME Administrators to College Secretary before the deadline, if you would like to transfer your administrator to HKAM via College.
- 3. In case of any discrepancy of the accredited CME Points between the College and the other Administrators, the College reserves the right of the final decision on the accredited CME Points.

As the College is required to report the CME Points to HKAM every 6 months,

4. MCHK CME registrants should continue to sign on the respective HKAM CME attendance record sheet for CME record purpose as usual. To help the College secretariat distinguishing College members from others, please identify yourself by entering your HKCFP membership number or simply putting "HKCFP" in the column of HKAM.

Interested members can download the required Registration Consent Form at <u>www.hkcfp.org.hk</u> > Download > 'MCHK CME Programme for Non-specialist' and return the completed form to our College Secretariat at <u>cmecpd@hkcfp.org.hk</u> before 22^{nd} June 2018 (Friday) to facilitate the necessary arrangements.

While the service is free of charge for all College members, submission may not be accredited if one fails to comply with the above-mentioned points. As usual, late submission may not proceed. Also, the MCHK CME record may not be updated if one fails to update MCHK CME Administrator in a timely fashion. 

Refresher Course in Practice Assessment Segment on 23 November 2017

Objectives of the course were to provide a comprehensive review on different segments of the Exit Examination; to discuss, and hence to reach consensus on the required standard of marking.

Examiners, trainee examiners, and examination observers were invited to our course. They were asked to complete pre-course assignment (marking simulated examination paper/ cases) before attending the respective sessions. In each session, segment coordinator and delegates gave overview of individual examination segment, followed by discussion on the pre-course assignment. The discussion had been more extensive and interactive than what we could have in the previous examiner standardization workshops.

Thanks to Exit Examination segment coordinators, subcommittee members and Specialty Board secretaries for taking up the tough work of organizing this Refresher Training Course. We are especially grateful to have Professor Doris Young (our Exit Examination External Examiner) and Professor Cindy Lam (our College Censor) sat in the panel of speakers leading a fruitful discussion. LESS is MORE? - Believe it or not, it is true again!

When we are advising our diabetic patients to lose weight, it is usually about modifications in diet content and amount, and how adequately exercises should be done. Something that we may not have thought of before, or may not have scientific proof in the past, has turned out to be effective as well – the eating speed.

The evidence comes from an analysis of longitudinal health check-up data of Japanese diabetic men and women. Panel data from 2008 to 2013 were generated from commercially available insurance claims data and health check-up data obtained during that period. Body mass index was measured



and obesity defined as BMI >=25. After exclusion of subjects with missing data for BMI and lifestyle habits, the sample comprised a total of 59 717 individuals.

Primary outcome of this study was obesity status, while the secondary ones were BMI and waist circumference. Other variables were also included in the study, e.g. lifestyle habits.

Lifestyle habits were evaluated from the responses to questions asked during health check-up, with the corresponding categorical variables shown below.

The generalized estimating equation model showed that eating more slowly inhibited the development of obesity. The odds ratio for slow-speed (0.58) and normal-speed eaters (0.71) with P<0.001 demonstrated that these groups are less

likely to be obese than fast eaters. Not having food after dinner or within 2 hours before sleep are also found to have an encouraging effect on reducing excess body weight. Moreover, the fixed -effects models showed that eating slower reduced BMI and waist circumference.

Despite possible reporting bias of self-assessed lifestyle habits and inclusion of relatively health-conscious individuals joining the health check-up




in the analysis, it is a large-scale panel data analysis of nearly 60 000 diabetic subjects over a 6-year duration verifying the effects of changes in eating speed on obesity.

From now on, apart from which types of food are more or less favorable in weight control, we can also advise our diabetic patients: ' the LESS fast you eat, the MORE weight you lose.'

Interest Group in Dermatology – The 64th Meeting on 3 March 2018

Learning points

In this presentation, Dr. Sung discussed the concept of spondyloarthritis (SpA), the cutaneous manifestations in SpA, the relationship between psoriasis and psoriatic arthropathy, and finally the treatment goal and biological therapy of psoriasis.

SpA is an umbrella term, encompassing a group of inflammatory conditions with shared common features, including ankylosing spondylitis, psoriatic arthritis, reactive arthritis, arthritis associated with ulcerative colitis / Crohn's Disease, acute anterior uveitis, "juvenile SpA", and undifferentiated SpA. The Assessment of SpondyloArthritis International Society (ASAS) criteria broadly classifies SpA into axial SpA and peripheral SpA.

There has been strong association found between SpA and the human leukocyte antigen (HLA)-B27, with HLA-B27 found positive in 90-95% of patients with ankylosing spondylitis, and 50-60% of patients with psoriatic arthropathy.

The gut flora has also been incriminated as having a role in the pathogenesis of SpA. Normally, the gut flora is separated from the host by a gut epithelial barrier. When the integrity of the barrier is compromised, the gut flora become capable of initiating a systemic immune response, in which a cascade of events leads to inflammation in many patients with SpA.

Examples of cutaneous manifestations in SpA may include psoriatic skin and nail changes, erythema nodosum, pyoderma gangrenosum, circinate balanitis, and keratoderma, etc.

Psoriasis and psoriatic arthropathy are closely related. Both diseases share similar clinical features, genetic predisposition, immunopathogenesis, and response to anti-IL17 therapy. On the other hand, appropriate treatment for psoriasis could achieve complete remission of the cutaneous manifestations; while in psoriatic arthropathy, joint damages are permanent and irreversible despite drug treatment.

The treatment goal of psoriasis, as from the Delphi consensus, is to aim at involvement of \leq 1% of body surface area at 3 months after treatment initiation. Biologics are highly effective treatment modalities. Ustekinumab (anti-IL 12/23) is the first-line biologics in psoriasis, while Secukinumab (anti-IL 17) and anti-TNF therapy are the first line biologics in treating psoriasis and psoriatic arthropathy.

Biologics are safe and well tolerated in general. The major risk associated with biologics is the increased risk of tuberculosis (TB). It is recommended that latent TB should be screened by Mantoux test or Interferon gamma release assay (IGRA) before initiating targeted therapy. Isoniazid prophylaxis can be used for those with latent TB, with risk of TB activation reduced by up to 80% while on biologics.
