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Message from the President

Globally, we are facing an increasing trend in total population as well as that in longevity in life, and Hong Kong is no exception to the rule. However, population increase and ageing do come with extra challenges to the society, especially on health related issues which would further add to the burden on health service demands. HKCFP is pleased to see the Government's determination to strengthen primary health care services to address the needs of the population in the recent Policy Address.

In the first week of January 2019, I attended the 2019-20 Budget Consultation Meeting organised by the Financial Secretary, Mr. Paul Chan. In the meeting, I welcomed the government's new concepts of setting up District Health Centres which are intended to provide service hubs in the districts for a spectrum of prevention and treatment activities so that the clinical services coordinated and provided by the family doctors in the localities would be further strengthened.

On the other hand, the role of the family doctor in the patient journey is crucial as the family doctor would know best about what, when and where the most appropriate services for the patient would be, based on the continuing and trusting relationship with the patient that places the family doctor to be the health advocate and navigator for the patient. There is strong evidence substantiating the gatekeeping role of the family doctors in that the societal health care resources are better utilised and the health outcomes are far superior in countries where there is a strong primary care system supported by family doctors in place. However, when we look at the family doctor manpower landscape, it is not difficult to find that the local scene is less than satisfactory. In the Budget Meeting, I proposed and reiterated the importance of the urgent need for the government to allocate more resources in the training of family doctors in Hong Kong to address the rising health burden due to population increase and ageing population, generating a basket of health issues, non-communicable diseases being one of the most

evident. Based on international comparison, a conservative estimate of an annual intake of 100 medical graduates to be trained as family doctors would be required to enhance the current system, and to make it sustainable. Our College is eager to work with the Government for the betterment of the health of the Hong Kong population.



Another fresh evidence on the importance of family medicine in the global health scene is the signing of a landmark Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between World Health Organisation (WHO) and World Organisation of Family Doctors (WONCA) on 28th January 2019 (on page 2) to recognise the key role played by family doctors in achieving universal health coverage by providing comprehensive, patient-centred, and professional care. As many may have already realised, WHO does not sign MOU lightly. Dr. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus Director General of WHO and Professor Donald KT Li our WONCA President have helped to strengthen the global link between health services improvement policies and family medicine programmes. Hopefully, we can work together with the stakeholders locally in Hong Kong to achieve the same goal soon!

WORLD ORGANIZATION OF FAMILY DOCTORS SIGNS LANDMARK MOU WITH WHO

The World Health Organization (WHO) and the World Organization of Family Doctors (WONCA) signed a Memorandum of Understanding on 28th January 2019, during the annual Executive Board meeting of WHO in Geneva, in which all WHO Member States participate.

Director General of WHO Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus and Dr Donald Li, WONCA World President signed the MOU to consolidate the relationship between the two organisations.

The MOU reflects the key role played by family doctors and GPs in achieving the global goal of Universal Health Coverage, through comprehensive, patient-centred, professional primary care. It clearly acknowledges the importance of the primary care team in the delivery of appropriate, affordable care to the world's population.

The MOU aims to strengthen and improve health services and family medicine programmes, with particular attention to medical professional training, undergraduate and postgraduate training programmes, continuing professional development and programmes to encourage cross-disciplinary working.

The goal to achieve Universal Health Coverage is a key element of Sustainable Development Goal 3 and of WHO's Global Health For All policy. With 500,000+ members across the globe, WONCA clearly has a key role to play in both mobilising and delivering effective, accessible, primary health care. WHO is keen to engage with professional organisations which can help to deliver the global goal: the MOU will facilitate stronger engagement between the organisations, both at policy level and within each of the regions and countries of operation.

Benefiting from the expertise within its membership, WONCA supports Member Organisations and their national health systems to develop and further improve primary care delivery. They do this through a variety of ways: technical support for undergraduate and postgraduate training programmes; establishment of family medicine as a distinct speciality in medical school programmes and in health systems; accreditation of postgraduate family medicine programmes; and accreditation of primary care practices in countries which do not yet have their own regulations and standards.

Through collaboration with a range of professional organisations WONCA aims to promote the use of qualified, multidisciplinary, primary care teams to deliver health care across the globe.

Following the signing of the MOU, WONCA President Dr. Donald Li, a practicing family physician from Hong Kong, said 'This MOU builds on our long relationship with WHO and reflects our joint commitment to reach every corner of the globe, to achieve effective accessible primary care for every single person. We look forward to working closely with WHO at central level, through regional offices and in individual countries to achieve Universal Health Coverage'.

THIRTY-THIRD CONJOINT HKCFP/RACGP FELLOWSHIP EXAMINATION SECOND Announcement

The Board of Conjoint Examination is pleased to announce the following information on the Thirty-third Conjoint Fellowship Examination with the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners to be held in 2019.

(1) REQUIREMENTS AND ELIGIBILITY

All candidates **MUST** be at the time of application for the Examination and at the time of the Conjoint Examination:

- 1. FULL OR ASSOCIATE members of BOTH HKCFP AND RACGP*
- 2. FULLY REGISTERED with the Hong Kong Medical Council*

(*Documentary evidence is required with the application – including a valid RACGP number.)

(**Note**: All candidates are required to renew their RACGP membership for the year 2019/2020 before 31 July 2019. Failure to comply with the rule may result in denial of admission to the Exam.)

In addition, they must be EITHER CATEGORY I OR CATEGORY II CANDIDATES: -

(a) **CATEGORY I CANDIDATES** are graduate doctors who are undergoing or have completed a fully approved vocational training programme as outlined in the College's Handbook for Vocational Training in Family Medicine. After satisfactory completion of two years of approved training, Category I candidates or trainees may apply to sit the Written Examination, both the two segments of which must be taken at the same attempt. After satisfactory completion of four years of supervised training, Category I candidates may apply to sit the Clinical Examination.

Note: All Category I candidates who are current vocational trainees and apply to sit the Written Examination <u>MUST</u> submit evidence of completion of at least 15 months of approved training by 31 March 2019, together with the application. Those current vocational trainees who apply for the Clinical Examination <u>MUST</u> submit evidence of completion of at least 39 months of approved training by 31 March 2019, together with the application. Candidates who have already completed vocational training <u>MUST</u> submit evidence of completion of vocational training, together with the application.

Part-time trainees must submit evidence of completion of their vocational training by the time of the Written Examination before they can apply to sit the examination.)

(b) **CATEGORY II CANDIDATES** are doctors who have been predominantly in general practice for not less than **five** years by 30 June 2019.

Category II candidates may opt to only sit for the Written Examination at the first and subsequent application.

For successful Category I candidates who have enrolled in the vocational training programme before 31 December 2018, and who apply for the award of RACGP Fellowship before 1 March 2027, will remain entitled to be awarded FRACGP. All other successful candidates are eligible to apply for the award of International Conjoint RACGP Fellowship (ICFRACGP).

Enquiries about eligibility to sit the examination should be directed to the Chairman of the Board of Conjoint Examination.

The eligibility of candidates of both categories is subject to the final approval of the Board of Conjoint Examination, HKCFP.

Application will not be processed unless all the documents are submitted with the application form.

(2) FORMAT AND CONTENTS

A. Written Examination

Applied Knowledge Test (AKT)*, and

Key Feature Problems (KFP)

*Note: Multiple Choice Questions (MCQ) has been renamed as Applied Knowledge Test (AKT) from Conjoint Exam 2018, with no major change on the exam format.

B. Clinical Examination

Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE)

(3) PRE-REQUISITE FOR CLINICAL SEGMENTS

All candidates applying to sit for the Clinical Examination of the Conjoint Fellowship Examination MUST possess a APCLS (Advanced Primary Care Life Support) certificate issued by the HKCFP*. This validity of this certificate must span the time at which the application for the Examination is made AND the time of the Clinical Examination.

Application will not be processed unless the pre-requisite is fulfilled.

*Note: In regarding the APCLS certificate as issued by the HKCFP, the APCLS workshops & examinations for 2019 will be held on **23 - 24 February 2019** and **30 - 31 March 2019** respectively. secretariat at 2871 8899 IMMEDIATELY if you do not hold a valid APCLS certificate issued by HKCFP and intend to sit for the Conjoint Examination 2019.

(4) CRITERIA FOR A PASS IN THE EXAMINATION

A candidate will be required to pass the entire Written Examination in one sitting. That is, if one fails the Written Examination, both the AKT and KFP segments have to be re-taken. Successful Written Examination result can be retained for three years (until the Clinical Examination of 2022).

The Clinical Examination can only be taken after successful attempt of the Written Examination. If one fails the Clinical Examination, all the OSCE stations have to be re-taken.

A candidate has to pass both the Written and the Clinical Examinations in order to pass the Conjoint HKCFP/RACGP Fellowship Examination.

(5) APPLICATION AND EXAMINATION FEES

Application forms are available from the College Secretariat at Room 803-4, HKAM Jockey Club Building, 99 Wong Chuk Hang Road, Aberdeen, Hong Kong. You may also download the application forms from our College website, http://www.hkcfp.org.hk. Please note that the deadline for application is **10 April 2019 (Wednesday)**.

For both CATEGORY I and CATEGORY II CANDIDATES:

Application Fee:

\$3,000*

[*Note: For candidates who are first sitting for the OSCE exam and have passed the Written Examination in 2016, provided that the administration fee for the whole Conjoint Examination have been previously settled, only the Clinical Examination fee of \$15,000 would be applied, that is, application fee of \$3,000 would NOT be applied.]

Examination Fee:

Full Examination (Written + Clinical) \$30,000
 Written Examination \$15,000
 Clinical Examination \$15,000

Please make the cheque payable to "HKCFP Education Limited". If a candidate applied for the Full Examination but failed in the Written Examination, the Clinical Examination fee (\$15,000) will be refunded.

(6) REFUND POLICY

If a candidate wishes to withdraw from the examination, and written notice of withdrawal is received by the College 60 days or more prior to the date of the examination, he will receive a refund of \$30,000 (for the whole examination), \$15,000 (for the written examination) or \$15,000 (for the clinical examination). The application fee of \$3,000 will not be refunded. No refund will be given if the written notice of withdrawal is received by the College within 60 days of the date of the examination.

All fees paid are not transferable to subsequent examinations.

The HKCFP Photography Club Astrophotography Lecture was delightfully concluded on 12 Jan 2019. The event would not have been successful without the tremendous support from Ms. Connie Luk, Manager of Showroom and Nikon Professional Service, Nikon Hong Kong Ltd, and the marvelous presentation by Mr. Huey Pang. Also the lecture would be less perfect without the generous special discounts offered by Nikon Hong Kong Ltd on its latest mirrorless cameras and lenses!

Mr. Huey Pang is an astronomy scholar and an energetic photographer in astrophotography. His expertise encompasses a wide range of astronomical photography and he has won awards in a number of large-scale astrophotography competitions. With his extensive experience as an astrophotography tutor and a speaker in astronomy, Mr. Pang wonderfully enlightened participants on the beauty of astrophotography.

A couple of important messages were evident from this lecture:

- 1. The post-exposure retouching work in astrophotography can be much more extensive than in other fields of photography, and it should also be done without damaging the scientific value of the image.
- 2. Hong Kong is located in a geographically privileged region to be able to view the Milky Way all year round. But the local night sky suffers much more light pollution than ten or twenty years ago. Everyone should come hand in hand to reduce light pollution to enable our next generation to continue to enjoy astronomy.



Cardiovascular Risk Calculators

Globally, cardiovascular diseases are the number one cause of death. Many cardiovascular disease risk calculators have been developed to help us identify and treat high risk groups early. The well-known prediction models include the Framingham Risk Score (FRS), Systematic Coronary Risk Evaluation (SCORE), the World Health Organisation/International Society of Hypertension (WHO/ISH), as well as the QRISK calculator.

Framingham calculator was based on North American data. It includes age, sex, cholesterol-high density lipoprotein ratio, blood pressure, diabetes and smoking status. It helps to predict the 10-year risk of cardiovascular events including coronary death, myocardial infarction, coronary insufficiency, angina, ischaemic stroke, haemorrhagic stroke, transient ischaemic attack, peripheral vascular disease, and heart failure. It has been claimed that the Framingham calculator may underestimate cardiovascular risk in people with diabetes, South Asian men and those who are socially deprived.

SCORE calculator was based on data from 12 cohort studies from 11 European countries. It takes into account the age, gender, total cholesterol, systolic blood pressure and smoking status. The calculator mainly helps to predict 10-year risk of cardiovascular mortality (including ischaemic heart disease, heart failure, conduction disorders and cerebrovascular disease).

WHO/ISH calculator was based on hypothetical cohorts for different regions. It also takes into account age, gender, systolic blood pressure, smoking status, diabetes and with or without total cholesterol. It predicts 10-year risk of cardiovascular events such as coronary heart disease, stroke and other atherosclerotic disease.

QRISK calculator was based on data from UK population. It takes into account the basic risk factors included in the Framingham score as well as ethnicity, deprivation (measured with the Townsend deprivation Score), family history of coronary heart disease in a first degree relative aged less than 60 years, atrial fibrillation, rheumatoid arthritis, blood pressure treatment and body mass index. It predicts 10-year cardiovascular disease. It is now updated to QRISK3, which includes additional risk factors (chronic kidney disease, a measure of systolic blood pressure variability, migraine, corticosteroids, SLE, atypical antipsychotics, severe mental illness, HIV/AIDS and erectile dysfunction.

However, none of these was based on data from Chinese or Asian. Therefore, there might always be concerns about how well can these calculators predict the cardiovascular risk in our population.

In 2017, a guideline (中國心血管病預防指南2017) on how to prevent cardiovascular disease has been published in the Chinese Journal of Cardiology, which helps to

predict 10-year risk of atherosclerotic cardiovascular diseases (ASCVD) for Chinese population. The prediction was based on data from Chinese population since 2007. It takes into account age, blood pressure, total cholesterol, LDL cholesterol, past history of cardio/cerebrovascular disease, diabetes, smoking and body mass index. It categorizes patients into 4 groups: very high, high (≥10%), medium (5-9%) and low risk (<5%). Patients already have atherosclerotic diseases such as ischaemic heart disease, stroke, peripheral vascular disease will be counted as very high risk. Patients with 1) diabetes and ≥40 years old, 2) LDL-C≥4.9mmol/L (190mg/dl) or total cholesterol ≥7.2mmol/L (280mg/dl), 3) grade 3 hypertension (≥180/110mmHg), or 4) heavy smoker ≥30 cigarettes per day will be counted as high risk and do not need to go through the risk calculation. Patients not having the above risk factors can have risk calculation using the chart below. According to the guideline, the recommended target LDL levels for very high, high, and medium/low risk individuals are <1.8mmol/L, <2.6mmol/L and <3.4mmol/ L, respectively. With this reference based on Chinese population, we could now have one more cardiovascular risk calculator to consider when managing our patients at risk for cardio/cerebrovascular diseases.

FAMILY DOCTORS COLUMN

Should We Attend Our Patient's Funeral?

Let me say at the outset that I have not been able to find out the definitive answer to the title question. I offer only a humble personal perspective and conclusions as it relates to a recent case of mine.

My late patient Mr. Ho Wah Keung, Matthew* was a 62 year-old retired driver who lived in a public housing estate with his wife and adult son.

He first presented to me with a few months history of painless PRB. There was also some modest weight loss and a feeling of incomplete emptying at stool. There was no relevant family history. On examination, he was not clinically anaemic. Abdominal palpation revealed a hard non-tender apple-sized mass in the left lower quadrant. Proctoscopy was normal.

After explaining my findings, I can remember I was impressed with this particular patient even at this first consultation. His manner was polite, the history he gave was clear. He was cooperative during the examination and he was calm and clear-headed when we discussed what should be done next.

Within one week he had a colostomy fitted privately for unresectable CRC.

Shortly after discharge he returned to the clinic to inform me of the surgery and discussed his upcoming appointment with the Oncologist and Surgeon of Hospital Authority. After conducting a physical examination, I did my best to answer the many questions he had. His demeanor was positive and he was confident that he would and could face whatever the disease would throw at him next, but at the same time realistic about his prognosis.

Over the following months, Matthew was to become a regular in the clinic.

Initially, when he was still under follow up by Surgical and Oncology, he would be attending for somewhat straightforward complaints like checking of the stoma site, assessment of intercurrent cough, headaches etc, usually to see if these symptoms were harbingers of something sinister.

Then as his disease progressed and his follow up with Surgical and Oncology colleagues became more tiring and less useful for him, my role as his GP was enlarged. Matthew was determined to stay at home as long as he could and he was especially determined to keep away from the Accident and Emergency Department as he believed they would always try to admit him.

So at this time I was required to draw on dormant palliative care skills to treat the myriad complaints when and as they arose: pain (thankfully not much in this case), dyspnoea from pulmonary metastases, peripheral oedema due hypoalbuminaemia and lymphatic obstruction, sacral pressure sores, nausea, oral thrush etc.

My opinion of this patient grew with each doctor / patient encounter. Admiration for both his bravery and his tenacity in the face of his illness.

One day I returned from a weekend off and his wife sent me a message. Matthew had been admitted to the hospice and would I see him there. I explained that I would definitely visit him after my duty hours, this time necessarily as his friend not as his doctor.

On two occasions before his passing I was able to visit Matthew in the hospice and I can safely say we were delighted to see each other each time. The last visit even though he was quite poorly on holding his hand I noted despite his cachectic frailty his hand grip strength was still quite good, his peripheral perfusion good, his pulse felt regular and rate normal. We discussed a little his disease and the treatment there, but much more we chatted about, and I was able to gain a lot of insight into, his life till now, his childhood, growing up, education, family life and his current interest centered around his church group.

Two weeks after admission to the hospice Matthew's son, on notifying me of his father's passing away asked would I like to attend the funeral service? My instant and emotional reaction was of course I must pay my final respects to this patient who had so trusted me professionally with his care. But was that the right response? I subsequently wondered.

So the question I needed an answer to was: "Should doctors attend their patient's funeral?"

Naturally I firstly did a quick Google search and after a brief read it seemed there was nothing unethical about attending I may have been unaware of, or any likely breach in the code of practice.

Next I decided to approach the question using Cognitive Behavioural Therapy. I filled in a thought monitoring form under the following headings:

- **Situation:** I have been asked to attend the funeral of my patient.
- Feelings: I feel sad and I will not have Matthew's welcome
 presence in my patient list any more, I always liked to see him
 and I have lost a patient who valued my professional skills. I feel
 nervous as I have not previously attended a local funeral and I do
 not want to make an unintended cultural error during the service.
- **Beliefs:** Doctors should not become emotionally attached to their patients. My presence at the funeral may prove distracting or become an unwelcome reminder to family and friends of failure of the doctors to cure Matthew.
- Thinking errors: shoulds, predicting catastophe, comparing, jumping to negative conclusions etc.
- **Dispute:** The alternative more balance view is that my presence at the funeral would be unlikely to be unwelcome as I have been specifically invited. Furthermore I am attending on my day off and there is no advantage to me professionally so I am unlikely to breach any ethical boundary.
- Advice to a Friend: By attending the funeral you demonstrate to Matthew's wife and son that Matthew was a special patient admired by his doctor that in itself is likely to help the family in their grief. It will also be an opportunity for me to say a silent final farewell.
- Positive actions: Review local funeral customs and related Cantonese terms. Respond in the affirmative to the family I will be honoured to attend the service.

In the final analysis I decided that I am a Family Doctor. Being a Family Doctor means being in the people business. It means continuity of care of the whole patient. And sometimes that continuity of care to the patient extends even after death.

Ultimately I was glad that I attended the funeral and fulfilled this final service to my patient.

LEARNING POINTS FROM BOARD OF EDUCATION

Topic : Eczema Treatment for Primary Care

Learning Points

Dr. Wu started off by giving a very detailed account on the pathogenesis and clinical features of atopic eczema/ dermatitis (AD), followed by the strategies for better management.

AD is indeed one of the most commonly encountered dermatological conditions in our daily practice. It is a chronic relapsing pruritic inflammatory skin condition that affects all age groups. Thus, maintaining a good quality long-term remission should be the shared objective between physicians and patients. There are mainly 2 main hypotheses on the pathogenesis of atopic eczema: 1) **Primary immune system dysfunction**; 2) **Primary skin barrier dysfunction**.

As for AD skin care maintenance, the use of emollients is crucial as maintenance treatment and prevention of flares. There are newer topical agents that are designed to target specific skin barrier function defects observed in AD. They have distinct ratios of lipids that mimic endogenous compositions. Preservatives are essential in water-based products, such as creams and lotions, causing skin irritations. Ointments on the other hand, though more greasy, are generally well tolerated as they contain less preservatives. Bleach water bath (in 0.005% bleach) may be considered in children with AD with infective components or at risk of infection. However, necessary precaution is stressed during patient education as its misuse would worsen the condition.

Topical steroids are the first-line treatment of AD flares as short term therapy. Tapering can be initiated once the itch has largely improved.

Detrimental effects may arise with prolonged and inappropriate use. Yet, poor compliance due to steroid phobia should be adequately addressed to avoid under-treatment. Topical calcineurin inhibitors (TCI), e.g. 0.1% tarcolimus ointment and 1% pimecrolimus cream, are alternative or additional therapeutic approaches to topical steroids without their unwanted side effects.

Traditionally, anti-inflammatory topical therapy is used to lesional skin only and is stopped or tapered once visible lesions subside. Proactive treatment, the new AD treatment approach, constitutes a combination of predefined, long-term, anti-inflammatory treatment applied usually twice a week to previously affected skin with liberal use of emollients. As such, intermittent use of topical steroids (e.g. twice a week) may be used safely for at least 20 weeks as a proactive therapy to prevent flares. Tacrolimus ointment has also been shown to be safe and effective as a proactive therapy (e.g. twice a week) for up to 1 year in reducing flares and improving the quality of life in both children and adults.

Dr. Wu then ended the talk by sharing a number of interesting clinical cases to remind us the important differential diagnoses to be considered in patients presenting with "apparently eczematous rash", e.g. drug eruption, psoriasis, cutaneous T-cell lymphoma etc.

Advanced Primary Care Life Support (APCLS) Training and Examination Workshop 2019

As required by the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP), CPR training course needs to have advance component on airway management, neck support and automated external defibrillation (AED) on top of basic life support. In order to align with our Sister College (RACGP) and in achievement of reciprocal recognition in Conjoint Fellowship Examination and Quality Assurance Certificate, the CPR Subcommittee of the Board of Education is pleased to announce that an enhanced CPR course, the Advanced Primary Care Life Support (APCLS) had been launched since 2017.

APCLS course materials have been endorsed by HKCFP Council in 2015 and the Resuscitation Council of Hong Kong (RCHK) in 2016. The course aims to widen the scope of our existing CPR training course by adding several important elements: use of automated external defibrillator (AED), use of airways adjuncts and dealing with initial trauma care through use of neck support.

TWO APCLS Training and Examination Workshops will be held in 2019 (23-24 February 2019 and 30-31 March 2019).

As no one is guaranteed to pass in the first attempt, members who plan to sit for the 2019 Conjoint Examination are strongly advised to register in our APCLS session. Members are reminded that a valid HKCFP APCLS Certificate is a pre-requisite for enrolment of the Conjoint Examination. Members who plan to sit for the 2018 Conjoint Examination are also reminded to check the validity of their HKCFP APCLS Certificate to make sure that it is valid at the time of application and also at the time Clinical Examination.
