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Message from the President

Happy New Year!

2020 not only marks the beginning of a new year, but is also the commencement of our new 2020-2022 specialist CME/CPD triennium cycle according to Hong Kong Academy of Medicine. A minimum of 90 credit points must be obtained in the three-year cycle from a combination of CPD and CME activities, with at least 15 CPD points included. No more than 75 points can be awarded for passive participation as attendee in Formal College Approved Activity (FCAA) in a cycle. Members are encouraged to plan for training activities ahead.

Based on the 30th Sun Yat Sen Oration delivered on June 2019, Professor Amanda Howe addressed the three principles for family physicians in modern times, namely identity, humanity and equity, in the latest volume (December 2019) of The Hong Kong Practitioners. We should continue to build and strengthen our discipline as Family Medicine practitioners through ensuring excellent exposure to General Practice in medical schools, strong postgraduate Family Medicine specialty training, ongoing career development and last but not least, building research capacity in primary health care. We should be proud of our unique characteristics as we are trained to deal with people across all life stages, deal with all types of health problems at point of first contact in the community and offer service that is "comprehensive, accessible, focuses on a specific community, allows continuity over time, and is centred on the care of people not specific parts of

their bodies or disease". We should seek humanity and act humanely in our practice by providing services focusing on the needs of patients. In addition, Professor Howe also reminded us that the World Organisation of Family Doctors (WONCA) is always there to



back up family doctors in the pursue of universal health coverage.

Professor Rodger Charlton also shared his perspectives on UK primary care in the same issue of our College journal. He started his article, "New models of primary care in the UK", by quoting Heraclitus the Philosopher, "The only constant in life is change" in the latest volume of The Hong Kong Practitioners and shared with us the significant change of consultation brought by technology advancement in UK. The traditional face-to-face

consultation is rapidly evolving to digital consultation (or e-consultation) through smart phone devices. New innovative model of care was developed in response to the increasing demand for health care and patients' expectations for instant access and the UK GP workforce crisis relating to recruitment and retention. E-consultation has taken off in 2017 with a new organisation called "GP at Hand", working with Babylon, which is said to be a leading digital health provider in UK. The change has not only brought challenges to the conventional consultation models, but also to one of the fundamental values in primary health care, continuity of care, and hence, to the mutual trust relationship between a family doctor and his/ her patients. The change in UK may have a wider impact as digital consultation seeks to expand further afield. Professor Charlton reminded other countries about the need to be prepared and to embrace the new changes so as to ensure the key attributes of accessible, good, personal and patientcentred care are maintained in the community.

Words cannot express how saddened we are learning about the bushfires that have caused serious damages in various parts of Australia. Our hearts are with our colleagues, friends and families of RACGP as well as everyone in Australia. We do hope that things will be settling back to normal very soon and we send our best wishes from Hong Kong.

January is a time for setting goals, embarking upon adventures and putting together personal plans. To achieve the targets set can be one of the best incentives to spark off innovations. Hope that you are ready for the new challenges in the new year!

THIRTY-FOURTH CONJOINT HKCFP/RACGP FELLOWSHIP EXAMINATION FIRST Announcement

The Board of Conjoint Examination is pleased to announce the following information on the Thirty-fourth Conjoint Fellowship Examination with the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners to be held in 2020.

(1) REQUIREMENTS AND ELIGIBILITY

All candidates <u>MUST</u> be FULL OR ASSOCIATE members of BOTH HKCFP AND RACGP* at the time of application for the Examination and at the time of the Conjoint Examination.

(*Documentary evidence is required with the application – including a valid RACGP number.)

(**Note**: All candidates are required to renew their RACGP membership for the year 2020/2021 before 31 July 2020. Failure to comply with the rule may result in denial of admission to the Exam.)

In addition, they must be EITHER CATEGORY I OR CATEGORY II CANDIDATES: -

(a) **CATEGORY I CANDIDATES** are graduate doctors (FULLY OR LIMITED registered with the Hong Kong Medical Council) who are undergoing or have completed a fully approved vocational training programme as outlined in the College's Handbook for Vocational Training in Family Medicine.

After satisfactory completion of two years of approved training, Category I candidates or trainees may apply to sit the Written Examination, both the two segments of which must be taken at the same attempt. After satisfactory completion of four years of supervised training, Category I candidates may apply to sit the Clinical Examination.

(**Note:** For Category I candidates who have enrolled in the vocational training programme before 31 December 2018, and who apply for the award of RACGP Fellowship before 1 March 2027, they will remain entitled to be awarded FRACGP. All other candidates are eligible to apply for the award of International Conjoint RACGP Fellowship (ICFRACGP).

All Category I candidates who are current vocational trainees and apply to sit the Written Examination <u>MUST</u> submit evidence of completion of at least 15 months of approved training by 31 March 2020, together with the application. Those current vocational trainees who apply for the Clinical Examination <u>MUST</u> submit evidence of completion of at least 39 months of approved training by 31 March 2020, together with the application. Candidates who have already completed vocational training <u>MUST</u> submit evidence of completion of vocational training, together with the application.

Part-time trainees must submit evidence of completion of their vocational training by the time of the Written Examination before they can apply to sit the examination.)

(b) **CATEGORY II CANDIDATES** are doctors who are FULLY registered with the Hong Kong Medical Council and have been predominantly in general practice in Hong Kong for not less than **five** years by 30 June 2020.

Category II candidates may opt to only sit for the Written Examination at the first and subsequent application. Enquiries about eligibility to sit the examination should be directed to the Chairman of the Board of Conjoint Examination.

The eligibility of candidates of both categories is subject to the final approval of the Board of Conjoint Examination, HKCFP.

Application will not be processed unless all the documents are submitted with the application form.

(2) FORMAT AND CONTENTS

A. Written Examination

Applied Knowledge Test (AKT)*, and

Key Feature Problems (KFP)

*Note: Multiple Choice Questions (MCQ) has been renamed as Applied Knowledge Test (AKT) from Conjoint Exam 2018, with no major change on the exam format.

B. Clinical Examination

Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE)

(3) PRE-REQUISITE FOR CLINICAL SEGMENTS

All candidates applying to sit for the Clinical Examination of the Conjoint Fellowship Examination MUST possess a APCLS (Advanced Primary Care Life Support) certificate issued by the HKCFP*. This validity of this certificate must span the time at which the application for the Examination is made AND the time of the Clinical Examination.

Application will not be processed unless the pre-requisite is fulfilled.

*Note: In regarding the APCLS certificate as issued by the HKCFP, the APCLS workshops & examinations for 2020 will be held on **29 February – 1 March 2020** and **28 – 29 March 2020** respectively. Details regarding the workshop

/ examination can be referred to the News of Board of Education (on pg. 20). Please register with our College secretariat at 2871 8899 IMMEDIATELY if you do not hold a valid APCLS certificate issued by HKCFP and intend to sit for the Conjoint Examination 2020.

(4) CRITERIA FOR A PASS IN THE EXAMINATION

A candidate will be required to pass the entire Written Examination in one sitting. That is, if one fails the Written Examination, both the AKT and KFP segments have to be re-taken. Successful Written Examination result can be retained for three years (until the Clinical Examination of 2023).

The Clinical Examination can only be taken after successful attempt of the Written Examination. If one fails the Clinical Examination, all the OSCE stations have to be re-taken.

A candidate has to pass both the Written and the Clinical Examinations in order to pass the Conjoint HKCFP/RACGP Fellowship Examination.

(5) APPLICATION AND EXAMINATION FEES

Application forms are available from the College Secretariat at Room 803-4, HKAM Jockey Club Building, 99 Wong Chuk Hang Road, Aberdeen, Hong Kong. You may also download the application forms from our College website, http://www.hkcfp.org.hk. Please note that the deadline for application is **8 April 2020 (Wednesday)**.

Please make the cheque payable to "HKCFP Education Limited". If a candidate applied for the Full Examination but failed in the Written Examination, the Clinical Examination fee (\$15,500) will be refunded.

(6) REFUND POLICY

If a candidate wishes to withdraw from the examination, and written notice of withdrawal is received by the College 60 days or more prior to the date of the examination, he / she will receive a refund of \$31,000 (for the whole examination), \$15,500 (for the written examination) or \$15,500 (for the clinical examination). The application fee of \$3,000 will not be refunded.

No refund will be given if the written notice of withdrawal is received by the College within 60 days of the date of the examination.

All fees paid are not transferable to subsequent examinations.

(8) ELECTION TO FELLOWSHIP

Members should be aware that passing the Conjoint Fellowship Examination does NOT equate with election to the Fellowship of either the Hong Kong College of Family Physicians or the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners. Those wishing to apply for Fellowship of either or both College(s) should ensure that they satisfy the requirements of the College(s) concerned.

Internship in FM

The new FM internship programme started in 2017, which is a 6-month bundled programme including 6 weeks in FM, 6 weeks in AED and 3 months in Internal Medicine. In July 2017, my internship began with a 6-week training in Aberdeen Jockey Club GOPC. It is my pleasure to be the first intern in HKWC FM.

Being the first intern in the department, there was no one that I could ask about their experience and tips. Before I started, I was very nervous about what is the role of an FM intern. What duties would I be assigned? Would I be asked to see patient on my own on the first day of work?

Fortunately, the intern training was a very structured programme, with 2 weeks of orientation at the beginning. I had attachment in different services of the clinic including RAMP (Risk Assessment and Management Programme), IMHP (Integrated Mental Health Programme), dietician, optometry, physiotherapy, wound clinic and continence care clinic. In IMHP, I had attachment with both the keyworker (occupational therapist) and doctor, where patients with anxiety or depressive mood could receive early intervention for their mental problems. Through these attachments, I learnt more about different services provided at our clinic, which allows me to better utilize them during consultation. I also had sit-in consultations with MOs.

After getting used to the routine work in GOPC, I was assigned with duties including consultation, RAMP clinic and blood taking. In RAMP clinic, I had the opportunity to see patients with chronic diseases including diabetes

and hypertension, and discuss the results of their annual blood tests and give them advice about lifestyle modification. I still remember how nervous I was on the first time of seeing patient on my own, as I could not expect who was waiting outside my room and what challenges he/she would bring to me. Throughout the training, I have gained more confidence in doing consultation. The most unforgettable moment was that at the end of a consultation, my patient requested to see me in her follow-up appointment, which was very encouraging for an intern. I was thankful that as an intern, I was given the privilege to spend more time on each patient.

Contrary to other specialties where interns mainly follow instructions from MOs and assist their daily ward duties, interns in FM have greater independence in patient care. I was allowed to see patients on my own to make diagnosis and decide the plan of management. Overall, the experience of being an intern in FM was very rewarding and has improved my confidence in decision making. I am grateful for the generous help and supervision from all MOs, nurses and allied health colleagues during my 6 weeks of internship. I would highly recommend everyone who is interested in FM to choose this internship rotation.

FM internship

After a curriculum review of the internship training in Hospital Authority, internship training was extended to Family Medicine since Jul 2017. It aims at enhancing the intern training in Family Medicine and primary care. In the programme, interns have opportunities to learn patient communication and clinical management at the out-patient setting, especially chronic disease management.

In the new intern curriculum, there is an option on a 12-week training period which includes both Family Medicine and Emergency Medicine. 6-week training is conducted in at least two General Outpatient Clinics in Family Medicine.

Within this 6-week training period, the interns in our Department are able to acquire consultation and communication skills. They will be arranged to have consultation under supervision. Moreover, there is consultation skill training through sit-in consultations and video reviews every week. Apart from consultations,

the interns learn to perform some common clinic procedures such as venous blood taking, cryotherapy, trigger finger injection and ear irrigation. For their exposure to multi-disciplinary team care approach in primary care setting, they will have attachment in our various nursing and allied health programmes including Risk Assessment and Management Programme, Integrated Mental Health Programme, smoking cessation and counselling, wound management, optometry service, dietitian service and continence care programme. Last but not the least, they received training on practice management, clinical audit & research, and also presented in our structured training seminar.

Positive feedback on this programme has been received from the interns, and we have come to the 3rd year of the Family Medicine internship programme. We hope that the programme will continue to enhance the learning of interns and finally can attract more doctors to Family Medicine in the future.



Cannabis-based products and medicines

Cannabis-based products, commonly known as CBD (cannabidiol), are becoming popular in the North America and Europe. It can be found in various products like pain relieving cream, cosmetics and even candies. Users believe that it helps to relieve pain, sleep problem and anxiety.

What are cannabinoids?

Cannabinoids are active chemicals that can induce druglike effects. The cannabis plant (marijuana) contains more than 100 cannabinoids, the two main types that are of medical interest are Tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) and CBD. THC is the main active ingredient in cannabis producing the 'high' effect. THC can increase appetite and reduce nausea, decrease pain and inflammation, and alleviate muscle control problem. CBD is not popular for recreational use since it does not make user 'high'. It may be effective in the control of pain, inflammation and epileptic seizures.

Differences between medicinal and illegal cannabis

Medicinal cannabis is different from illegal cannabis. It is produced under strict pharmaceutical conditions, the composition and potency of THC/CBD is known. The routes of intake are mostly oral or sublingual.

Illicit recreational cannabis may contain pollutants and heavy metals. It is usually taken in the form of smoking, which can induce respiratory tract problems like chronic bronchitis

Benefits of medicinal cannabis

The scientific ground for use of medicinal cannabis is not yet complete. Research has shown some evidence that medicinal cannabis may be useful in the following conditions:

- > Certain childhood epilepsies
- > Spasticity and pain in multiple sclerosis
- ➤ Chronic non-cancer pain
- > Nausea and vomiting induced by chemotherapy
- Anorexia caused by Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS)

Side effects of medicinal cannabis

The degree of side effects depends on type of medicinal cannabis and may varies between individuals. In general, adverse effects from CBD-dominant products are less frequent than that of THC-dominant products.

Approved medicinal cannabis in the United States (US) and United Kingdom (UK)

The US Food and Drug Administration approved two medications containing THC, namely dronabinol and nabilone. They treat nausea related to chemotherapy and promote appetite in patients with severe weight loss caused by AIDS.

NICE guideline stated that cannabis-based medicinal products can be used for the following conditions:

- ➤ Nabilone can be considered for intractable nausea and vomiting induced by chemotherapy.
- > Trial of THC:CBD spray can be offered to treat moderate to severe spasticity in multiple sclerosis.
- ➤ CBD is licensed as adjunctive therapy for seizures associated with Lennox-Gastaut syndrome or Dravet syndrome.

THC and CBD in Hong Kong (HK)

THC is a dangerous drug controlled under the Dangerous Drugs Ordinance, and trafficking any products containing THC constitutes a criminal offence. CBD is not a dangerous drug but there is no registered pharmaceutical product available in HK yet. Regarding food products or drinks containing CBD, since it is difficult to extract pure CBD, they may contain other cannabinoids like THC. Import of these products may breach our local law.

The committee wishes to highlight that Colleagues **must engage in ALL categories of activities** in order to fulfill the QA Certificate 2017-2019 criteria, briefly summarized as follows:

- (1) A minimum of 90 points in total, including at least 30 CPD points.
- (2) A maximum of 45 credit points will be counted for each category of educational activities
- (3) Participants must engage in **ALL** categories of activities

For Point (2) and (3) above, the 'categories' are referring to

- i) Category 3, related to CPD activities,
- ii) Category 4, related to CME activities organized by our College alone, and
- iii) Category 5, related to pre-accredited CME activities organized by other professional institutions themselves or in collaboration with our College. Examples of this category include accredited educational events organized by the Hong Kong Medical Association, The Universities, the Hospital Authority, and the Primary Care Office / Department of Health.

Advanced Primary Care Life Support (APCLS) Training and Examination Workshop 2020

As required by the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP), CPR training course needs to have advanced component on airway management, neck support and automated external defibrillation (AED) on top of basic life support. In order to align with our Sister College (RACGP) and in achievement of reciprocal recognition in Conjoint Fellowship Examination and Quality Assurance Certificate, the CPR Subcommittee of the Board of Education is pleased to announce that an enhanced CPR course, the Advanced Primary Care Life Support (APCLS) had been launched in 2017.

APCLS course materials have been endorsed by HKCFP Council in 2015 and the Resuscitation Council of Hong Kong (RCHK) in 2016. The course aims to widen the scope of our existing CPR training course by adding several important elements: use of automated external defibrillator (AED), use of airways adjuncts and dealing with initial trauma care through use of neck support.
