## **Message from the President**

## **Professional Development**

In the past few weeks, I travelled to three different places where I have engaged in professional development activities. Firstly, I was invited by the Macau Health Bureau as the External Examiner for the assessment of doctors in general practice for their promotions. I went to a meeting with the Officials of the Bureau in Macau to discuss finalizing the criteria for assessment. Macau has a different system of the enrollment and training of medical practitioners. To sit for the examination, these doctors need at least 5 years of experiences in general practice under the Bureau. They have to present the curriculum vitae similar to our Basic vocational training logbook which should list in details the duration of exposures in various medical services, both in hospital and general practice. Three examiners would be appointed by the Macau government which will be gazetted in the announcement of the assessment. Candidates are required to submit all relevant documents within a stated period of time, so that these three examiners can assess and mark the documents. Marking criteria are clearly laid down in the gazette and examiners will have to follow these criteria. The second part will be an oral examination which will last for sixty to ninety minutes. The three examiners will take turns to ask questions either as a test of the candidate's medical knowledge or to clarify any matters arising from the logbook. Marks will be given according

to the candidate's response to the questions raised. In order to get a pass, the

sum of marks from the two segments should be higher than 50%, which means promotion to a higher medical grade as well as salary increments.

This is something quite different from our current system of assessment of postgraduate qualification which only tests knowledge and skills, but does not take into consideration practice experience and other medical educational activities. Is there anything we can learn from this, especially for those general practitioners who have started private practice before formal vocational training being available to them in Hong Kong?

My second trip was to Shunde district of Guangdong Province. Through the introduction of Shunde Min Yuen Tong (Hong Kong) 旅港順德綿遠堂, a charitable organization in support of medical education in Hong Kong and the native Shunde, I was invited to participate in a Symposium in Shunde 順德區北滘醫院《粤港社區醫療服務論壇》with the title《健康管理理論在社區醫療服務中的實踐》organized by the Southern Medical University 南方醫科大學,Beijiao Hospital 順德區北滘醫院 and 佛山市順德區衛生和人口計劃生育局. speaker, Dr. Geng Qingshan is the Deputy Director-General of the Department of Health of Guangdong Province. Dr. Cheung Man Kuen joined me to go at short notice. I introduced to them the mission of our College, what we have done in the past 30 years and the core domains of Family Medicine. Dr. Cheung talked about the training pathway and activities of trainees enrolled in vocational training. She also shared with them her own training experience and emphasized the value of training in her professional development. We received a lot of interesting questions from the audience and they were very keen to know how our experiences would be able to assist them to develop a structured training in Shunde. Even local television reporters were present to have a short interview with me about the purpose of our visit.

Are we ready to take up the challenge to assist our country in the healthcare reform based on a proper system of family doctors based in the community? Standard setting and assessment must take into consideration of the level of service and resources available in a large country with huge population like China. We must be pragmatic before we can achieve a realistic goal step by step. I hope our younger generation of fellows can take up this most worthwhile challenge to contribute to our country.

The third place I have visited was Cairns where I was invited to the annual Academic Session of the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners on 6th October. I met old friends and supporters of our College including Drs. David Game, Wes Fabb, Beth Jane and of course Dr. Chris Mitchell whom I have enjoyed a very close working relationship in the past two years. This is the most important occasion of RACGP to present all the awards and honours to their College Fellows, who have contributed to the College activities selflessly over the years. With our long history of partnership, I have to send them my congratulations in person. Congratulations again to Prof. Claire Jackson who has been elected as the President of RACGP for the coming two years.

Each research project submitted will be assessed according to the seven criteria listed above by a selection panel. Each criterion may attract a different weighting to be decided by the selection panel. ## **Assessment of Family Physician**

I read with interest the President's Message in the HKCFP – Family Physician Links Issue 75, September 2010 – Dr. Gene Tsoi discussed the captioned, with reference to the Practice Assessment, Clinical Audit and Consultation Skill Assessment CSA; "...most of the cases seen [at CSA] by examiners are stable and well controlled diabetes, hypertension ..."

Some examiners are aware of such phenomenon, the causes of which I shall not dwell on here. With the current CSA format, we use a specific tool, a specific criterion referencing rating system. However, the limitation being we can only have 2 hours [120 minutes] examination time; and for all practical purposes [definitely not by intention] only 6-7 cases can be rated.

Over the past 2-3 years there have been proposals to address the aforementioned undesirable issues. (A) The new CSA will have 6 hours of live video recording, which are triple the current examinable time. (B) A minimal of 18-24 cases [not yet finalized] will be recorded – which tally to three to four times the current CSA clinical loading. (C) Examiners will have the authority to choose "non-chronic cases", as they feel fit, to better assess the real life clinical challenges to family physicians.

By the way, there is also new proposed criterion for Clinical Audit CA, hoping to address more on impact factor / outcome changes. There should also be a new Research Segment - which I shall leave for others to deliberate.

I certainly hope that President, members of College and members of public would be pleased to note certain Teams and Committees' members are constantly working to improve the quality of family medicine practice.

## **Promoting Mental Wellness**

No matter where we practise - in private clinics, in Hospital Authority General Out-Patient Clinics (GOPCs) or in Family Clinics for civil servants - we must all have encountered patients with mental disturbance in the primary care setting. Due to various limitations and constraints in the health care system, handling these patients poses a great challenge to many of us.

Hong Kong is well-known to be nerve-racking and competitive; people have high stress levels and long working hours. News about domestic violence and suicide are not rare in the media. Mental health issues have attracted public interest over the past few years. The Policy Address 2009-2010 has stated the need to strengthen mental health services in our community. Development of well-organized mental health services involving various disciplines is of the utmost importance in order to cater for the increasing demand of patients with mental health problems and to promote the healthy development of our society.

A Mental Wellness Centre was set up in Kowloon West Cluster GOPCs last year to promote mental wellbeings of patients. Many patients seen in the primary care setting are in the early stage of disease manifestations. Same for mental health diseases, many patients may present with early mood disorders or may only have mental disturbances from daily stressors rather than the onset of a full-blown mental disorder. Studies in western countries show that there are a number of patients who attend their family physicians before committing suicides. If they can be identified and treated early, disease progression can be halted. Community resources can be conserved for treating patients with severe mood disorders, thereby reducing the occurrence of suicide and domestic violence.



The Mental Wellness Centre aims at early identification of mental disorders, early intervention for patients with mental disturbances, and promoting public awareness on importance of mental health. For patients attending one of the 23 GOPCs in Kowloon West Cluster, we perform mental health screening by using the WHO-5 Wellbeing Index screening form. Positively screened patients who meet our criteria or those presenting with symptoms of mild mental disturbance are then referred to the Mental Wellness Centre for individual and group interventions. Patients are assessed by the case manager, either an advanced practice nurse or an allied health professional. After an initial assessment, brief psychological support and counselling will be provided accordingly. Problem solving techniques, relaxation exercises, stress management techniques, ways to tackle insomnia, lifestyle redesign and promotion of positive thinking and life attitude in the format of individual or group counselling are offered depending on patients' needs and preferences. Patients having more severe mental disturbance are assessed by Clinical Psychologist and Family Medicine specialist for further intervention and management. Weekly team meetings are held for case discussion and monitoring of patient progress.

In an 8-month period (August 2009- March 2010), more than 500 patients attended our Mental Wellness Centre, around 300 patients completed the service and were already discharged in an average of less than 4-5 individual attendances. 70% of them were discharged without the need of further follow-ups. Most of them suffered from mild mood disturbance, mild anxiety and mild adjustment disorders. The mean WHO-5 scoring was 8.9 (cut-off: 13) before receiving interventions, while the mean post WHO-5 scoring was 14.5 on discharge.

Family physicians play important roles in prevention and early intervention. Hypertension,

diabetes, osteoporosis screening and many other health screenings have been well-accepted and there are structured screening programs in primary care clinics and in the community for these physical diseases. Mental wellbeing is an important aspect of being healthy as defined by the WHO. The Mental Wellness Centre is a pilot multi-disciplinary mental health project in GOPCs for early detection and intervention of mental disorders. With increasing resources from the government for mental health problems, we hope new mental health services can be set up in the primary care to address the increasing demand for patients.



## **Medical Mission Trip in Myanmar**

This was my first medical mission trip. The trip was very meaningful and it impacted my interpretation on the meaning of life. I would like to share this beautiful trip with you all.

The day before starting the medical services, we visited a school for deaf-mute children. It provided schooling for children from pre-school to the 10<sup>th</sup> grade. It taught speech reading, sign language, finger spelling, reading, writing and calculation. Some simple vocational trainings were given such as sewing, tailoring, knitting, stitching, and basic computer training.

The building was old, the floor and the windows were broken, there was no air-conditioning, the light was dim...... however despite the poor environment the children paid extreme attention and the teachers were very patient. I saw one teacher showing a little boy how to read speech by picking up the boy's small fingers and touching their own lips, allowing them to feel the movement and vibration of the lips. I saw the LOVE from that teacher. Children here learned happily, growing up with healthy minds so that they can live and earn on their own, independently. We played games with them and they laughed happily and smiled sweetly. They were filled with happiness when we gave them small gifts such as balloons and colour pens. This was not easily found in Hong Kong kids.

Then we had four days of medical services in Myanmar. The first day we stayed at the village, the second at the YMCA clinic, the third day we went to a volunteer center and on the fourth day we stayed at another farm village.

At the beginning of service each day, we gave them health talks, such as teaching them how to wash their hands properly, how to brush their teeth, how to maintain good hygiene and appropriate posture with manual work. Thereafter, we started our medical services, giving patients drugs and health advice. Some of our volunteer workers played with them and we all had a lot of fun.

The cases we saw there were just like what we saw in general outpatient clinics. There were different types of cases; most of them were related to hygiene problems such as flu and gastroenteritis. TB was more common there. Some patients presented with chronic cough, and some presented with TB lymph nodes. They also suffered from many dental problems as they had no toothbrushes. Luckily, a local dentist joined us to provide some basic dental services such as extraction and filling. Though there were only a few types of basic simple dental equipments, they were adequate to accomplish many different dental treatments. For many of the cases, they needed further investigations and drug treatments. However, some people could not afford the expenses and died as a consequence. Some alarming cases were encountered such as severe weight loss, generalized weakness such that the patient could not rise up from bed, a child presented with chronic bleeding from the hard palate, a woman showed a large mass on the skin near the mouth..... What people needed there was further checkups, investigations and treatments.

Such problems would never happen in Hong Kong; every person in Hong Kong can see doctors and enjoy health care services irrespective of their wealth. Some patients in Hong Kong even misuse our system, repeatedly requesting unnecessary investigations. If we can relocate some of the resources from wealthier societies to poorer countries more lives could be saved. I felt so grateful to live in a well-developed society. We should thank God and treasure what we have.

People in Myanmar are happy. Indeed, they appear to be happier than we are in Hong Kong. Every time we gave small gifts to them or performed small favours, they were very happy and much satisfied. Although they are physically poor and live in simple houses with little furnitures and torn clothings, they are mentally richer than us.

Actually, life can be simple!!



## What's happening with Rosiglitazone?

Recently the use of the antidiabetic agent rosiglitazone has been subject to controversy. On 29 September, 2010, the Hospital Authority announced that two preparations, Avandia and Avandamet, which contain rosiglitazone as an active component, would be removed from its drug formulary. There are approximately 2,000 patients currently receiving rosiglitazone in public hospitals and out-patient clinics. They are recommended to continue the medication until the next follow-up appointment to ensure optimal glycaemic control. The decision of the HA is in accordance with the recommendation from the Committee on Medicinal Products for Human Use of the European Medicines Agency.<sup>1</sup>

So what does the current evidence say about rosiglitazone? Two important studies offer caveats on its pharmacovigilance in clinical practice.

Graham and colleagues studied the risk of serious cardiovascular harm by rosiglitazone as compared with pioglitazone, another thiazolidinedione marketed in the US.<sup>2</sup> They conducted a nation-wide, retrospective cohort study of 227,571 Medicare beneficiaries aged > 65 years who initiated treatment with either drug from July 2009-June 2009 and who were followed-up for up to 3 years after medication initiation. It was found from Cox proportional hazard models that rosiglitazone was associated with stroke (Hazard ratio [HR] 1.27, 95% C.I. 1.12-1.45), heart failure (HR 1.25, 95% C.I. 1.16-1.34), all- cause mortality (HR 1.14, 95% C.I. 1.05-1.24) and a composite of acute myocardial infarction, stroke, heart failure and death (HR 1.18, 95% C.I. 1.27-2.08) when compared with pioglitazone. Its large sample size and the robust study methodology for analysis of this inception cohort were impressive and give the study credibility, despite its retrospective nature.

Another study which adds caution to rosiglitazone's use stems from an updated meta-analysis of randomized controlled trials reviewing the effects of rosiglitazone therapy on myocardial infarction (MI) and mortality.<sup>3</sup> This included a total of 56 trials, or 35,531 patients receiving either a rosiglitazone or a control medication. It was found that rosiglitazone therapy significantly increased the risk of MI (odds ratio [OR] 1.28, 95% C.I. 1.02-1.63), which points towards an unfavourable benefit to risk ratio for rosiglitazone. These two studies were published in very high impact international journals.

However, future studies will not simply end here, as newer oral hypoglycaemic agents continue to be marketed, and evaluated for their efficacy and safety profiles.

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## **Interest Group in Dermatology – the 21<sup>st</sup> Meeting on 4<sup>th</sup> September 2010**

The 21<sup>st</sup> Dermatology Interest Group meeting was held on 4<sup>th</sup> September, 2010. Our speaker was Dr. Lo Kuen Kong who was just retired from Consultant Dermatologist and Head of Social Hygiene Service of the Government. Our sponsor was Galderma Hong Kong Ltd. The topic was "Sun and Skin".

There are essentially three types of Ultraviolet radiation (UVR) in Sunlight:

- 1. UVC (100-290 nm) has the shortest wavelength and usually cannot penetrate the ozone layer and reach the earth's surface.
- 2. UVB (290-320nm) has longer wavelength, able to reach skin surface, causing tanning and acute sunburn (300nm UVB is 1000 times more erythrogenic than 360nm UVA).
- 3.UVA (320-400nm) has even longer wavelength, able to reach deep into skin, releasing free radicals, causing DNA damage and inducing premalignant lesions / cancers of the skin. It can also lead to photoaging by breaking down collagen and elastin (as distinguished from chronological ageing, the wrinkles are deep and coarse, and there are increased mottled pigmentation, xerosis, telangiectasia, skin atrophy, solar keratosis and elastosis).

To protect against sunlight, the following practical tips can be given to our patients:

- avoid sun's peak UV hours between 10am and 4pm
- 2. seek shades whenever possible
- 3. wear long-sleeve shirts, hats, sunglasses; bring umbrellas
- 4. wear broad spectrum sunscreen daily year round especially on face. (N.B. UVA rays are present year round and can penetrate through glasses and windows). Reapply sunscreen preferably every two hours.

Beneficial effects of sunscreen include prevention against acute sunburn and erythema and chronic photoaging, protection of photosensitive skin and prevention of skin cancers.

Sunscreen used should have a broad spectrum against both UVA and UVB rays. The inorganic physical blockers (e.g. titanium dioxide and zinc oxide) are usually more effective in blocking both UVB and UVA rays. The newer organic sunscreen e.g. Mexoryl XL and Tinosorb M are said to have comparable filter effects.

In choosing a proper sunscreen, the US Skin Cancer Foundation recommends a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 15. SPF measures the length of time a sunscreen product (in a standard quantity of 2mg/square cm) protects against skin erythema from UVB, compared to the time for the skin to redden without protection. For example, if you normally burn within 10 minutes of UVR exposure, a product with SPF 15 will theoretically allow you to stay out 15 times longer without burning (i.e. 150 minutes). Similarly, a product with SPF 30 should allow you to stay out for 300 minutes.

However, one should note that a product with SPF of 15 can already block 93% of UVB and a product with SPF higher than 30 can block an additional 4% of UVB (i.e. 97%) only. No matter how high is the SPF, there is no product that can block out 100% of UVB rays. One should also note that SPF rating is a measurement of protection afford to UVB rays only and there is still no international consensus on evaluation of UVA protection.

Although sunlight is beneficial for synthesis of Vitamin D at the skin, there is still no convincing evidence that increasing a person's conventionally normal serum 25 Hydroxy Vitamin D level has definite health benefits, especially in reducing colorectal cancer risks. In fact most people can obtain ample Vitamin D from a combination of diet, oral supplements and incidental protected sun exposure. It is therefore not advisable to ask our patients to have regular intentional UV exposure just for the purpose of obtaining sufficient Vitamin D.
